

MR. JONES HEADS EUGENE SCHOOLS FOR COMING YEAR

David John Jones, principal of Eugene high school, was selected superintendent of schools in Eugene to succeed Joseph T. Glenn at the meeting of the school board.

Advancement of the department of history at Eugene high, to the principalship was voted by the board. Heads were also named for the three junior high schools as follows: Stanley D. Eaton, Woodrow Wilson high school; Margaret Halvorsen, Theodore Roosevelt high; Mrs. Faye Robertson, Frances Woodard, Junior high.

Grammar school principals will be Ada Simon, Lincoln; E. R. Parker, George; Ida Patterson, Washington; Mrs. Rose E. Sticks, Patterson; J. G. Swan, Gordon. Mr. Swan has been assistant county school superintendent, and takes a position he held several years ago as principal at Gordon. Mrs. Halvorsen was advanced to the new junior high post, and other appointments were re-elected.

The general teaching staff of city schools will be chosen at the next meeting, Rev. F. G. Jennings, chairman of the board, announces.

CAPT. ALLWORTH BANQUET SPEAKER

Between 150 and 200 graduates and ex-students of Oregon Agricultural college are expected at the Memorial union banquet at 6:30 o'clock, says Charles A. Emery, president of the O. A. C. club. Captain E. C. Allworth of Portland, Professor E. T. Reed of Corvallis and John Cohn V. Dymott of Eugene will be speakers.

Captain Allworth, who was awarded the Levy Diamond medal by the state of Washington for the most distinguished and valorous service of a soldier citizen of that state during the world war, has also been decorated with the United States Congressional medal of honor.

"The army's citation of Captain Allworth's bravery tells of the time he was crossing the Meuse river and canal at Clercy-le-Petit, November 5, 1918. Some of his men had got over the bridge in safety and were making their way up in a steep embankment under heavy fire, when the bridge was destroyed by enemy shells. The detachment was thus cut in two, and the men on the farther side wavered. The situation was one of extreme peril. Seeing the emergency, Captain Allworth climbed the rear bank of the canal and called his men to follow. Thumping in he swam the stream under fire from the enemy. His men followed him instantly and led by his brilliant example, climbed the opposite slope to reinforce the advanced platoons."

"Under this example they forced the enemy back more than a kilometer, silenced several machine gun nests and captured 100 prisoners—more than their own numbers. All told, this initiative on Captain Allworth's part made possible the re-establishment of the bridgehead and successful advance of other troops."

Captain Allworth arrived in Eugene from Portland yesterday, and with Charles M. Hall of the Memorial Union committee, is aiding in making arrangements for the banquet.

CITY'S FINANCES BECOME PROBLEM

With one night officer dropped from the Eugene police force because of lack of money to pay his salary, the city council was again brought to face the city's financial situation last night. Several departments are finding it difficult to keep within the budget allotted them. Mayor E. B. Parks reported, and a meeting of the local clearing house association will be called Wednesday evening with the finance committee of the council to discuss ways and means of paying the city's bills.

EVANGELIST HAS VARIED CAREER; HOME LIFE BEST

The simplicity of the home life of the Demarest party was fully demonstrated to the writer as he dropped in upon them at their home while they are campaigning in Eugene. The evangelist, Victoria Booth-Clubb, Demarest was holding the baby and had changed her dress from the one in which we have been accustomed to see her wearing on the platform, to one of comfort. That she was enjoying her liberty, and enjoying the baby even more so, goes without saying.

She is quick to set one at ease and her welcoming smile eliminates all stiffness and formality at once. Several have remarked that Mrs. Demarest's smile is so approachable that it makes a friend before one has a chance to take the genuineness of it with reservation.

Wide Experience The writer, at one time, was permitted to look through some newspaper clippings that had been kept as souvenirs by the evangelist party and the thought flashed and has been tantalizing even more so after listening to her preach, that Eugene has not, as yet, awakened to the fact that she has been privileged to act as host to a woman of wide experience, and has been what we often term "a globe trotter" in her evangelistic campaigns in many parts of the globe.

She said that she had lived in France, in Belgium, in Germany, Holland, England, Canada and the United States.

It would be hard to put one's finger on her patriotism, because of so many places of residence, but she laughs them all aside and says: "My citizenship—my true citizenship is in heaven. I owe no allegiance to any country in preference to heaven, because a Christian's citizenship has been transferred from earth to heaven."

Mr. Demarest a Favorite Mr. Demarest, who leads the song service is a prime favorite with the chorus choir and with the audience generally. He likes to have the music "just so" but invites them into coming his way so adroitly and gently and yet firmly, that they would rather sing his way than any other.

Mrs. Barker, the general executive, is the buffer for the whole party. She is the one who stands in the breach at all times and displays a great deal of tact and good sound judgment.

"I was born in Paris, near the arch of Triumph, or as the French have it, the arch of victory," Mrs. Demarest said, "and I was given the name Victoria because that too means victory."

"There were ten of us children, five boys and five girls and all Christian workers but one. I consider this a wonderful testimony to my mother."

"My mother consecrated me at the Lord when I was an infant and was later re-consecrated by my grandfather, William Booth, founder of the Salvation Army. It was in Belgium, where my mother was preaching when I gave my heart to Jesus."

"My work in the Master's service has taken me into many dangerous places. I have visited a great many saloons where criminals of every conceivable type congregated. Many times I have felt my heart rising in my throat and was compelled to swallow 'to keep it down,' but these thrilling experiences have been safely passed through by breathing a prayer to God to help me and show me the way out."

"You have a beautiful city and I hope to do all the good I can. Of course, one is largely dependent upon the Christian people in every city to cooperate with the work of an evangelist and I am praying that our stay in your city may be productive of a great spiritual blessing."
