**Railway Rate Appeal Heard**  
SALEM, Ore., March 10.—Circuit Judges Kelly and McMahan today are hearing arguments on the appeal taken by the O. W. R. and N., and the Southern Pacific companies, from an order of the public service commission, decreasing rates on various farm products inside the state from 10 to 20 per cent. Circuit Judge Bingham heard arguments in the case several months ago and remanded the hearing to the commission for further testimony. The death of Judge Bingham in the meantime caused the re-arguments which are now being heard.
