

PROBE OF CHARGES DEMANDED AGAINST CLYDE N. JOHNSTON

Calling on District Attorney John S. Medley to investigate specific charges against Clyde N. Johnston, former district attorney of Lane, a writ of mandamus was filed today by Leon R. Edmonson through his attorney Paul C. Dormitzer.

The writ states "In the matter of the petition of Leon R. Edmonson for the issuance of a writ of mandamus compelling and requiring John S. Medley, the duly and regularly elected district attorney, to perform his duty by presenting the charges committed by Clyde N. Johnston while incumbent in office, to the grand jury."

The petition for the writ enumerates nine specific charges alleged to have been committed by the former district attorney. These involve actions in the way of raising on stills and the arrest of the alleged owners, when it is claimed the still was "planted." A charge also is made that Mr. Johnston declined to prosecute the case against Leslie Stevens, who was tried and convicted here on a charge brought by a girl. It is alleged that it was necessary for a special prosecutor to come from the office of the attorney general to take the case in the circuit court here.

It is also alleged that the former district attorney had knowledge of the criminal actions of others and that he used this to compel them to testify in cases for which he desired a conviction. It is alleged that the former prosecutor attempted to have false testimony introduced in order to gain a conviction over a man held on a liquor charge.

The suggestion comes after the socialists, without consulting either of the other middle parties, had decided to run Otto Braun as their own candidate.

P. E. Christensen, elected last night by the school board as principal of the Eugene high school, stated today that he would accept the position. Mr. Christensen, a graduate of the University of Oregon with the class of 1921, has been connected with the E. H. S. faculty since 1929 and for the past two years has been head of the department of history. The new principal is a graduate of the Eastern high school of Minneapolis and later taught in school in North Dakota. He was superintendent of the schools for Bottineau county, North Dakota, for six years, three terms. He also was engaged in education work in Woodburn, Ore., and at Alameda and Imbler in eastern Oregon before coming to the Eugene high school.

School of Whales Provides Target

SAN DIEGO, Cal., March 10.—Presence of a large school of whales off Magdalena bay gave crews of the Atlantic scouting fleet which is en route to San Diego for the general mobilization, an opportunity for submarine firing practice that they did not overlook according to reports to the hydrographic office here.

Masters of weathered steamers have reported that several whales bearing evidence of having been killed by battleship shells have been sighted off the lower California coast. The Norwegian whaling fleet now operating near Magdalena bay is reported to have been assisted materially in its quest for whale oil by the marksmanship of the Yankee gunners.

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BISHOP QUAYLE OF METHODIST CHURCH DIES AT HIS HOME

BALDWIN, Kans., March 10.—Bishop William A. Quayle, author, lecturer, educator and for more than a quarter century one of the outstanding figures of the Methodist Episcopal church, died at his home near here late yesterday.

Bishop Quayle had been in ill health for several years. He was 64 years old.

Death came following a sudden heart attack.

An outspoken republican, an active and keen political observer, and a renowned orator, teacher, lecturer and writer, Bishop William A. Quayle, of the Methodist Episcopal church, had held pastorates in Kansas City, Indianapolis and Chicago before his elevation to the Bishopric in 1908.

Born in 1866

He was born June 25, 1866 in Clay county, Mo., and at the age of four months was taken to the then Territory of Kansas by his parents. He studied in the preparatory department of Baker University, at Baldwin, Kansas, and later entered the collegiate where, upon his graduation, he was made professor of languages and vice-president of the institution. At the age of 30 he became president, serving for four years and then resigning to enter the ministry.

He was pastor of St. James church, Chicago, when called to fill one of the highest offices in the Methodist church. His episcopal residence was in St. Paul until 1916, when he returned to St. Louis.

Honored by Degrees

The degree of Ph. D. was conferred upon Bishop Quayle in 1892 by Allegheny college, and that of D. D. by DeWitt college the same year. Baker University honored him with the degree of LL. D. in 1900, and Lawrence college, Wisconsin, conferred the same degree in 1908.

Books written by Bishop Quayle include: "The Past and Other Essays," "A Study in Current Social Theories," "A Hero and Some Other Folks," "Books and Life," "In God's Out-Door," "Eternity in the Heart," "The Prairie and the Sea," "Lovel and the Christian Faith," "God's Calendar," "The Book of Ruth," "The Song of Songs," "The Pastor-Preacher," "Laymen in Action," "Beside Lake Beautiful," "Recovered Yesterdays in Literature," "The Dynamite of God," and "The Throne of Grace."

In 1886 Bishop Quayle married Miss Hannah Davis of St. Louis.

Women Entering Many new Fields

WASHINGTON, March 10.—Entry of women into new fields of work in recent years is reflected in the records of civil service employment where they hold many positions for which they hardly considered in the past, says a statement today by the civil service commission.

While until recent years "it was difficult to visualize a woman employee of the government in other than a clerical or stenographic position," the statement said, an increasing number is now being employed in the fields of chemistry, physics and other scientific work, in addition to teaching and other work.

Springfield Council Orders Improvement

SPRINGFIELD, March 10.—(Special)—The grading and macadamizing of Kelly boulevard, which extends for nearly half a mile north from D street to the pyramid at Dunbar, was ordered at the regular meeting of the city council at the city hall last evening. A new ordinance was also passed providing extensive sidewalk improvement throughout the entire city. Recorder Reuben W. Smith being instructed to look up the property, and Chief of Police Charles Nolf to notify the property holder. Concrete sidewalks to the extent of several blocks will then be laid.
