

WAR HEROES SPEAK AT O. A. C. MEETING

The opening gun in Oregon Agricultural college's campaign to raise Lane county's quota of the \$500,000 for erecting a Memorial Union building on the Aggie campus, was fired last night at a banquet, rally and dance for members of the Lane county O. A. C. club, at the chamber of commerce. More than 75 were present.

O. A. C. heroes of the world war were introduced, who told why the building should be erected as a memorial to the soldiers who lost their lives in France. Captain E. C. Allworth whose services have been lent to the memorial campaign by the Edwards Furniture company of Portland, and who is one of the 13 persons awarded the Congressional medal of honor for valor in action, told in allegorical form of the world war.

"While I wear a few decorations, they are only in trust for the boys who aren't with us," said Captain Allworth. "A memorial such as the one planned by O. A. C. is the finest tribute we could pay to them."

Hurray Dakin, Oregon's representative in the "Living Hall of Fame," a national organization composed of one man from each state who is found to be the most distinguished for acts of heroism, said that this honor was the biggest surprise of his life. "I don't feel right," he said, "being classed a hero out of 35,000 men on the front lines. They were all heroes. Those who paid with their lives are entitled to this memorial, and I am confident in the O. A. C. alumni for their ability to put the campaign across."

A tribute to President W. J. Kerr of Oregon Agricultural college was paid by Charles M. Emery of Eugene, president of the club. Zella Feike Bodewell, alumni secretary, said the memorial building campaign was a challenge to O. A. C. alumni for closer unity. Professor F. S. Dunn, bringing greetings from the University of Oregon, declared the project was "worthy of the highest of O. A. C." and that the university was behind the move.

C. B. Hall of the Portland office of the Memorial union, outlined the campaign plans, and met the local members of the soliciting committee. During the evening voluntary pledges of approximately \$1500 were given.

"O. A. C. made a contribution to the late war as great as any college in America," stated Professor E. T. Reed of Corvallis. "Every time the enemy was driven back an O. A. C.

Bethel School to Have new Building

Erection of a new school house in the Bethel district will be under way this summer and the building ready for occupancy by the opening of the school year in the fall, according to A. R. Hebee, chairman of the school board of district 92, who was here today to talk over the plans with E. J. Moore, county superintendent of schools. The new building will be of four-rooms with a full basement and will cost approximately \$10,000, Mr. Hebee states. The building will be financed by the issuing of negotiable warrants, the board chairman states. More than 60 pupils are now enrolled at the Bethel school.
