

SCOUT COUNCIL IS TO BE DISCUSSED AT MEETING HERE

Preliminary details of the organization of a first class Boy Scout council here and plans for employment of an executive will be discussed at a meeting this afternoon between a committee, representing local organizations, and H. G. Oberteuffer, representative of the Boy Scouts.

The Boy Scout director is well pleased with the organization already undertaken in Eugene and states that he sees a big future for the movement in this city.

At present there are three chartered troops here and one application pending. About 125 members are enrolled. Two of the local troops, Fairmount and the Christian church, are up to the membership limit and these will probably be reorganized in form of two troops each. It is announced, The Eugene high school scout troop is also near the limit in membership and a second troop may be formed there in the near future.

"It will be remembered that because of a 'good turn' done by a Boy Scout of London for Mr. W. D. Boyce of Chicago, the Boy Scouts of America came into existence," Mr. Oberteuffer said. "Mr. Boyce was so much impressed with the value of the movement which would cause boys to take seriously their scout obligation, that he secured the co-operation of Sir Robert Baden-Powell, and on February 8, 1910, incorporated the Boy Scouts of America.

"The Boy Scouts of America has a membership of nearly 901,500 men and boys, organized into over 21,000 troops, with 631 local councils. Since organization, over 2,000,000 men and boys have been enrolled as members. The president of the United States and many of the country's most distinguished citizens are actively identified with the movement in all parts of the country.

"Under its leadership over 2,500 troop and council camps were maintained last summer, and it is estimated that 300,000 boys had the benefit of such camps."

First National to Get Clock System

Something new in the way of a clock system for Eugene is to be installed by the First National bank as a part of the furnishings for the new lobby just completed. Joseph Mayer, representative of the Howard Clock company, was here today to talk over with the bank officials the new four-dial clock which will be hung from the ceiling in the center of the lobby. This is the latest type of time system used in the banks and other large buildings of the Pacific Coast, it is said. The clock can be seen from all parts of the lobby and can be connected with time-stamping machines for checks in any part of the bank.

Further steps in the petition filed yesterday for a writ of mandamus to compel District Attorney John E. Holdeman to present to the grand jury alleged evidence said to be held against Clyde N. Edmundson, former district attorney, were taken today by Paul C. Dornbier, attorney, on behalf of Leon R. Edmundson. The attorney has asked for an order of disqualification against Judge G. F. Skypworth of the circuit to hear the case. The order states alleged prejudice of the judge against Edmundson and further that the acquiescence of Judge Skypworth with Clyde N. Edmundson would present an impartial declaration.

Visitors Throng to Scene of Tomb of Ancient Egyptian

CAIRO, March 11.—(AP)—Crowds today visited the scene of the discovery of the tomb of Giza which it is hoped may prove to be that of a personage in the reign of the Pharaoh Senusert of the fourth dynasty. If not the tomb of the monarch himself, Hieric wife fencing, however, prevented the work of excavation, undertaken by the Boston-Harvard expedition, being interrupted and no additional information as to the progress of the task was forthcoming today from the excavators themselves.

It was learned, nevertheless, that mirrors placed at the bottom of the deep shaft to reflect the sun's rays into the tomb showed the contents much more clearly, especially the alabaster coffin which appears almost transparent.

State Judicial Council Named

The main duty of the council will be to try to work out uniform rules and procedure for the several judicial districts of the state.

WASHINGTON, March 11.—In legislation passed by congress President Coolidge today nominated Sergeant Ogden and Second Lieutenant Harding of the officers' reserve corps, two of the army world fliers, to be second lieutenants in the army air service.

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., March 11.—(Special)—Plans for the "City Beautiful" movement were discussed last evening at the regular meeting of the Ladies' Civic club in the chamber of commerce rooms. It was urged that townspeople give special attention to the planting of trees, shrubs and flowers. The campaign for beautifying the city will culminate in the annual Rose Show if there are enough roses to make it possible. Many of the bushes are reported frozen to the ground. Mrs. R. C. Markee, first vice-president, presided at the meeting in the absence of the president, Mrs. Paul Brattain, who is in Portland.

Huge Postal Card Order is Placed

WASHINGTON, March 11.—Anticipating much larger use of the new postal card by business firms for advertising purposes, instead of private mailing cards, the postoffice department has given the public printer orders for millions of these cards.

The new postal law increases the rate on souvenir and all other private mailing cards from one cent to two cents, beginning April 15.

Information reaching postal officials is that many business firms who heretofore have made their own private mailing cards will buy one cent postal cards, print their advertising thereon and thus escape postal rate.

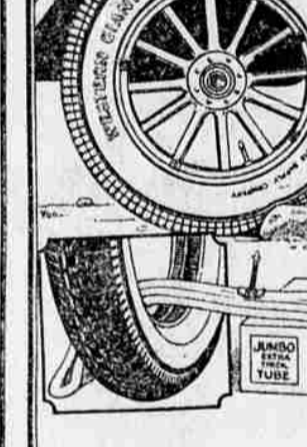
