State Files School Case Reply

EDUCATION IS STATE RIGHT, IS CONTENTION

Lower Court Should Have Dismissed Action, is Word in Brief

No Decisions of Supreme Court Have Been Cited By Opposition

WASHINGTON, March 12.—(AP)—An alarming increase in the criminality of the young, was attributed today in a brief filed in the supreme court by the Episcopal church domestic and foreign missionary society to the "exclusion" of religious influences from the public schools of the nation.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—(AP)—The states have supreme control over the education of children residing within their borders, the state of Oregon said today in a supplemental brief filed in the United States supreme court in its action to sustain its compulsory public school law.

ACCEPTANCES POUR IN FOR NEWS SESSION

Record Attendance is Indicated for Seventh Annual Convention

Added Attractions are to Be on Schedule for This Year

Acceptances already in hand at the school of journalism indicate that the Seventh Annual Oregon Newspaper conference, to be held at the University of Oregon Friday and Saturday of this week, will have the largest attendance in the seven years of its history. More than one hundred acceptances were in hand yesterday afternoon, a number in excess of the full attendance on several of the years.

SUN YAT-SEN DIES IN CHINA AT 63 YEARS

"China's Man of Destiny" Loses Long Fight for His Life

Will Emphasize Desire for Party Unity and Peace Among Ranks

PEKING, March 12.—(AP)—Dr. Sun Yat-sen, upon whose head the Manchukuo dynasty fixed a price of \$200,000 when Dr. Sun was campaigning for the republic in China, died here this morning, from cancer of the liver. He was 63 years old. Called "China's man of destiny" by many, Dr. Sun was identified with almost every phase of public life in his country. He was first president of the republic created in 1912, and in recent years he had maintained an administration styled the Southern Government of China at Canton. In his declining years he opposed the central government at Peking. Dr. Sun was stricken when he arrived here last in January as a delegate to a conference, having for its purpose the unification of China.

NAME IS SENT TO SENATORS BY PRESIDENT

Gauntlet Thrown Down in Battle to Choose Attorney General

Belief Expressed by Senator Butler That Nomination Will Carry

WASHINGTON, March 12.—(AP)—President Coolidge threw down the gauntlet to his opponents in the senate today by again submitting the nomination of Charles B. Warren to be attorney general.

Without Precedent.
Some old timers in the senate could recall no precedent for the return of a cabinet nomination that already had failed to command a majority. Such a failure itself has not occurred since the days of Andrew Jackson and all told there have been but five previous occasions on which the senate withheld its approval of any man chosen by the president to sit in his official family.

Up to Mr. Warren
Mr. Coolidge and the nominee listened attentively to this new presentation of the case. Then the president turned to Mr. Warren and left it to him to decide whether the issue should be fought out to a finish or considered closed. Mr. Warren decided in favor of a fight.

No sooner and news of the decision reached the capitol than the enemies of the Warren appointment began preparations to re-open a battle they thought they already had won. Senators Walsh of Montana and Reed of Missouri declared they would make a resistance even more stubborn than that which mustered 40 votes on Tuesday's roll call to offset and nullify the 40 commanded by the administration leaders.

Aged Pioneer of Willamette Valley Dies at Spokane

SPOKANE, Wash., March 12.—Mrs. Sarah Noyer, 87, who crossed the plains with her parents in 1847 in a wagon train, died here last night at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Rosa Williams. Her parents settled in the Willamette valley, Oregon, where they lived for 20 years, later moving to Pomeroy and Walla Walla, Wash. Besides Mrs. Williams she is survived by the following sons and daughters: Mrs. E. J. Barber, Sacramento, Calif.; Thomas Noyer, Pendleton, Ore.; I. N. Noyer, Blackfoot, Idaho; and J. and M. M. Noyer, Spokane.

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
