

MEN HEAR TALK OF EVANGELIST

Men who sin against girlhood and womanhood had black paint liberally applied to them last night at the armory by Victoria Booth-Clibborn Deane, the evangelist, who delivered a message to men only.

Probably 2500 men and young men were present and heard from the lips of a fearless woman a scathing denunciation of men who deliberately drag women down into paths of sin. She told the men that wherever there was a fallen woman there was a fallen man also. She denounced the double standard as not being in harmony with the plan of God, for the reason that God never recognized any such standard.

As blow after blow was hurled at them—right in their teeth—the men held their breath, not only because of the truth that was presented and held up in all its devilishness for men to see themselves as God sees them, but in awed admiration for the woman who dared tell them so. As shaft after shaft went home they repeatedly applauded her.

She used plain language—plain enough for any average man of intelligence to understand, yet any man who handled so delicate a subject would have had to go some to have excelled her in words so well chosen and her every manner one of perfect refinement.

Mrs. Deane led the singing, but being the only woman present, her voice was totally drowned out by the guttural tones that emanated from the throats of so many men. The men seemed to greatly enjoy the solo she sang for them, also the male quartet. There will be service each night this week, according to announcement, and tomorrow another lecture for women only at 3 p. m. This lecture will be in the nature of a continuation of the one delivered a week ago.

While she will speak particularly about marriage and motherhood, divorce and poodle dogs will come in for special reference.

With daily toll calls totaling more than 600, a yearly total of 10,000,000 calls is a fair estimate.
"Magnitude of the important part performed by the telephone in conducting the nation's business is indicated by figures showing the telephone calls placed in some of the larger cities, such as New York. The New York company reports during 1923 an average of more than 18,570 long distance calls every day kept New Yorkers in close touch with the rest of the country, while at the present time the total number of calls, local and long distance, in the city averages 6,200,000 every day—or almost as many as Eugene averages in a year. In other words every telephone in New York is used about five times every day.
"In the city of San Francisco there are slightly more than 300,000,000 telephone calls annually. If San Francisco's annual telephone talk could be combined into one conversation, it would require about 15 centuries to complete it."
