

MR. MITCHELL TO KEEP UP FIGHT TO UNIFY AIR SERVICE

MILWAUKEE, March 12.—With the view of winning his fight for a unified air service, "an air service of 50,000 fighting planes," Brigadier-General William A. Mitchell, will remain in the army, he told friends here last night, denying the rumor that he would seek a new career in congress.

"I have never thought of quitting," the general declared. "I'm going to keep on talking until America wakes up. And I expect to see a unified service within two years. My demotion, Oh, that's nothing at all."

The general expressed his satisfaction with the interest that congress has taken in the air problem.

"The trouble lies with the army and navy," he declared. "They don't want to see a change."

The general and Mrs. Mitchell are spending a week at the old Mitchell home here. The general has no immediate plans for the future, but expressed his hope of being transferred to the Chicago area when his demotion to a colonelcy takes effect.

the extension of the life of the patient was to his refusal to admit the seriousness of his condition since he underwent an operation on January 20. Dr. Sun believed until the last that he would recover.

At his death, Dr. Sun was surrounded by members of his family and several leaders in the Kuomintang party, the Sun Yat-Sen party, who were attracted to Peking by the approaching death of their leader.

"I want to be embalmed like my friend Lenin," the Russian leader, said Dr. Sun just before he died. He asked also that he be buried at Nanking where he first served as president. The body was sent to the Rockefeller hospital for embalming.

Casket Ordered

Orders have been cabled to Moscow for a casket similar to that used for the burial of Lenin.

Dr. Sun was conscious until the last. He gave instructions to his wife about personal matters. He talked rationally to his political associates and only yesterday first accepted the fact that the end was near.

In his will, executed last night, he left his houses and his books to his wife. It is said the estate of Dr. Sun was a modest one. His will emphasized his political wishes and the desire for party unity and peace in the ranks of his adherents, deprecating any attempt at revolution of the political philosophy of his associates.

The body will lie in state at some public place to be selected today. Dr. Sun died at the home of Dr. Wellington Koo, a former leader in the central government of China before the defeat of Chang Tso-Lin last year.

PARTY UNDISTURBED

PEKING, March 12.—(AP)—The death of Sun Yat Sen, first president of the Chinese republic, will not affect the affairs of the Kuomintang party, comprising followers of Dr. Sun, leaders of the party said today.

After leaving the room in which they heard their dying leader plead for party solidarity in his last words, the Kuomintang chiefs were busy preparing a circular telegram to the provinces, announcing the death of Dr. Sun.

The leaders denied a report that a serious split was impending in the Kuomintang party.

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STATE HIGHWAY CONTRACTS LET

SALEM, Ore., March 12.—The state highway commission yesterday awarded to Simonson and Hefty, a contract for surfacing the Bandon-Sixes river section of the Roosevelt highway on a bid of \$74,212. The contract covers an agreement to resurface 11.2 miles between Bandon and Curry county line, to surface 4.5 miles between the Curry county line and Denmark and five miles of resurfacing between Denmark and Sixes river.

At Hennessy of Marshfield received the contract for construction of a bridge over the North Fork of the Coquille river on the Coos Bay-Roseburg highway near Myrtle Point at \$50,280. The bridge bid and also the Bandon-Sixes river bid were received at a meeting in Portland February 26.

Surfacing of the Euche-Muscel creek section of the Roosevelt highway in Curry county was authorized. Announcement was made by the commission that it had adopted a definite location for the Santiam highway between Albany and Lebanon. This will be the North Santiam route on condition that Linn county acquires right of way to eliminate jogs and other obstacles.

Real Estate man Faces Charge of Murdering Woman

KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 12.—Charged in a dying statement by Mrs. Dora Gage, of Atchison, Kansas, with having given her poison so that he could collect insurance policies which she had assigned to him, Roy M. Turner, 25, was being held here today for investigation.

Mrs. Gage died at a hospital yesterday, shortly after she had been found in her hotel room, writhing in pain, on the floor. Turner, an Atchison real estate dealer, who came to Kansas City yesterday with Mrs. Gage, was in the room when hotel employees forced an entrance.

Before her death the woman asserted that Turner gave her a bottle which he told her contained corn whiskey. Mrs. Gage was immediately stricken.
