

SCOUT EXECUTIVE FOR CITY PLANNED

A salaried Boy Scout executive, and a general council composed of representatives of various civic organizations of Eugene, will carry on the scout work hereafter in the city, on a greater scale than ever before attempted, it was decided by the committee in charge last night. The following are members of the committee:

Lynn McCready, chairman, representing the American Legion post; Rev. Frederick G. Jennings, representing the Ministerial Union; Carl G. Washburne, the Rotary club; Harry Dunbar, Kiwanis club, and George Miller, Knights of Columbus. It met at the chamber of commerce yesterday noon at luncheon.

A sum of from \$3000 to \$4000 each year will be raised for the next five years, to finance Boy Scout work in Eugene. This sum will include the salary of the executive. No financial drive will be made, although the public will have opportunity to contribute.

Lumber Business Above Production

One hundred and nineteen mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending March 7, manufactured 90,837,520 feet of lumber; sold 109,006,140 feet; and shipped 102,089,224 feet.

New business was nine per cent above production. Shipments were 6 per cent below new business.

Forty-six per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 30,106,720 feet, of which 28,968,582 feet was for domestic cargo delivery; and 11,227,943 feet export. New business by rail amounted to 3772 cars.

Forty-four per cent of the lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 45,076,410 feet of which 26,830,463 feet moved coastwise and intercoastal; and 18,182,477 feet export. Rail shipments totaled 3712 cars.

Local auto and team deliveries totaled 5,619,814 feet.

Unfilled domestic cargo orders totaled 145,890,515 feet. Unfilled export orders 100,925,963 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders 5142 cars.

In the first ten weeks of the year, production reported to West Coast Lumbermen's association has been 955,315,290 feet; new business 967,100,104 feet; and shipments 958,647,953 feet.

STATE BONUS RULE TOLD BY ATTORNEY

Several changes in the state soldier bonus law were made by legislative action of the last legislature and attention is being called to these by Colonel J. M. Williams, attorney for the state bonus board in Lane county.

One provision is that any former service man who accepted the cash bonus when the law first went into effect may change and now obtain the loan by returning the cash. This plan will be in effect until June 30, 1932.

The loan privileges of the bonus law have been extended to the veterans of the Spanish war for all who served more than 90 days during this period. Colonel Williams estimates that there are about 30 veterans of the Spanish war in Lane county who are eligible for the loan.

Another change provides that the bonus law applies to all veterans who were in the army June 3, 1915 and whose period of reserve service extended over to the World war period when they were called to active service.

All these changes take effect May 26 this year, Colonel Williams states. About 250 loans have been made in Lane county so far, the colonel reports.

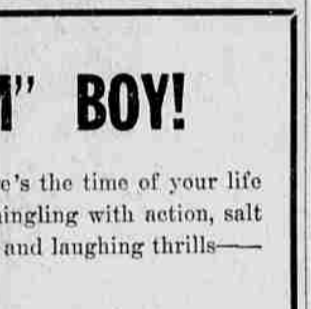
