

CASCADE CHANGES RULES IN CONTEST

To encourage addresses by contestants in the "Four C" or Cascade Careful Campers' Contest, Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor of the Cascade National forest, announced today that he would allow 50 per cent in additional points to the contestant who delivers an acceptable talk of 10 minutes or more during American Forest week.

"This additional credit is based on the total number of names and addresses of adults turned in on May 3," says Mr. Macduff. For instance, if a contestant's score was 20, and he made a speech on how to behave in the forest, he would gain 10 more points, or 30 all told. Additional talks after the first will count 10 points each.

"The paper or talk to be delivered must be prepared and submitted to the supervisor for approval before it is given, and a statement by the adult leader, teacher or head of the organization addressed must accompany the claim. Arrangements for making the talk must be made by the individual. Credit is allowed for these talks only during American Forest week."

Obituary

CHARLES W. ZUMWALT
Mr. Charles W. Zumwalt, an early pioneer of Lane county, Oregon, was born in St. Charles county, Mo., Jan. 4, 1846.

He was a son of Solomon and Nancy Zumwalt, pioneers of 51, being one of 14 children. Two sisters still survive. Mrs. Francis Hammett of Mohawk and Mrs. Matilda Warren, Tanque, Arizona.

In April, 1850, his parents started on the long journey to Oregon. They stayed the first winter at Salt Lake city, resuming their journey the next spring. They arrived at Portland on July 4, 1851. They remained there one year, then moved to Lane county, locating near the station of Lasson, just west of Eugene.

Mr. Zumwalt was a member of the M. E. church, having united with same when just a boy. He spent part of his life on a farm near Oakesdale, Wash., and the remainder in Lane county.

Mr. Zumwalt was first married to Millie Conrad, of this union two children survive, Mrs. B. S. Hay of Seaside, Ore., and H. K. Zumwalt of Donna, Ore. He was later married to Nancy Rush. One daughter survives, Mrs. William Pollock of Forest Grove, Ore.

Mr. Zumwalt died March 14, 1925. He has been in the care of his daughter, Mrs. Pollock, for some weeks past. Funeral services will be held Tuesday 17, 2:30 p. m. at Community church, Donna, Ore.
