

CITY FUNDS SHORT FOR INTERSECTIONS

Because the city of Eugene is "poor" as far as money to build intersections for paved streets is concerned, it is considered doubtful if the council will let contracts for the paving of Third avenue west, from Monday to Thursday, at tonight's meeting, according to Judge George A. Gilmore. This will make the second time bids for this street improvement work have been advertised, but until the council authorizes more intersection money in the coming bond election, it is held likely that paving work will come to a halt.

The council does not have a very long session ahead of it tonight, according to announcements from the city hall. A petition has been filed in recorder's office by taxpayers, asking that High street be paved from Thirteenth avenue to Sixteenth avenue. Several committee reports are expected.

STRAY SHOTS ARE FIRED AT DAWES

WASHINGTON, March 16.—During its debate today on the Warren nomination the senate digressed to conduct a post mortem on the vice-presidential end of the 1924 campaign and incidentally to discharge a few more stray shots at Vice-President Dawes, who was prevailing.

TWO KILLED WHEN TRAIN HITS AUTO

SEATTLE, March 16.—Two persons were killed early last night when the auto in which they were riding was struck and demolished by a northbound Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul passenger train at Algonia Crossing, 10 miles south of Seattle.

The dead are: Ernest Lappenbusch, 20, a resident of Buckley, employee of the Buckley Transfer company and driver of the automobile, and P. Keaton, 20, a resident of Harwood.

The bodies were found 150 feet from the scene of the accident. When the train was brought to a stop 600 feet from the crossing the engine of the automobile was found imbedded in the pilot of the locomotive.

EVIDENCE BARRED AT DOME HEARING

CHEYENNE, Wyo., March 16.—Evidence intended to reveal the secrets of the bank accounts of Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the interior, was barred from the record in the Teapot Dome lease annulment suit here today.

The ruling barring the evidence, handed down by Federal Judge T. Blake Kennedy, deprives the government of its only known means of attempting to prove an exchange of libery bonds between Fall and Harry F. Sinclair, whose Mammoth Oil company was given the lease on the big Wyoming oil reserve.

Judge Kennedy in his decision referred to the matter in question as involving something of unusual importance to the plaintiff's case but that as the matter stands, it is manifestly incompetent and will be barred until such time as it is shown to be competent.

Judge Kennedy's ruling left the government's case up in the air so completely that a recess of ten minutes was allowed.

Charles Robinson Loses his Appeal

LONDON, March 16.—Charles E. Robinson, the former bookmaker who sued the Midland Bank for 125,000 pounds sterling on account of an alleged settlement with Rajah Sir Hari Singh, has lost the appeal he took from the judgment of the court finding in favor of the bank. Robinson's effort to upset the judgment was today dismissed in the court of appeal.

The Robinson appeal was another of the many echoes of the sensational trial last year which involved an alleged blackmailing plot against the Indian potentate, with Mrs. Robinson, wife of the bookmaker, playing a prominent part in the testimony.

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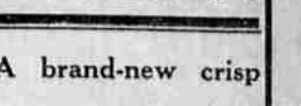
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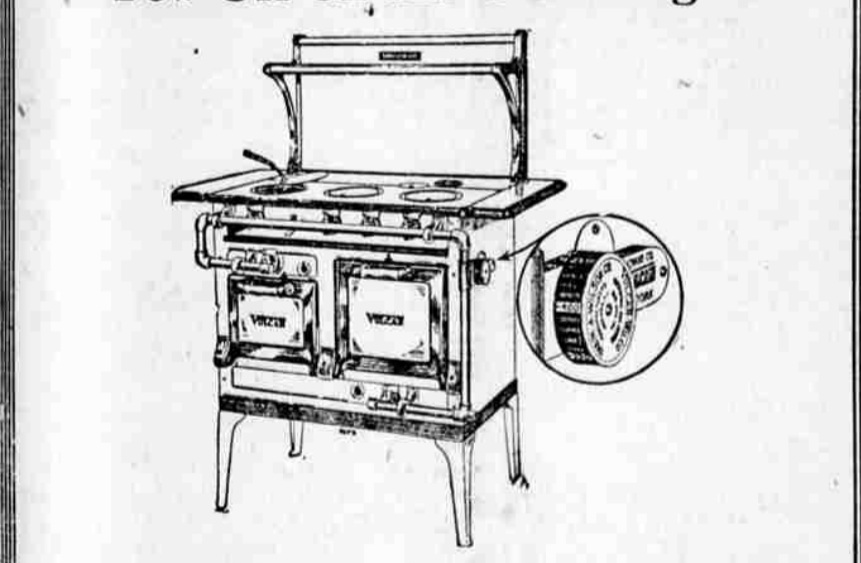
