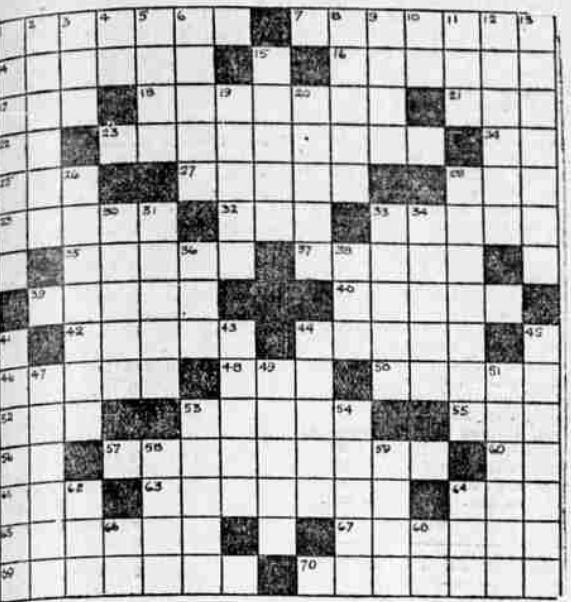


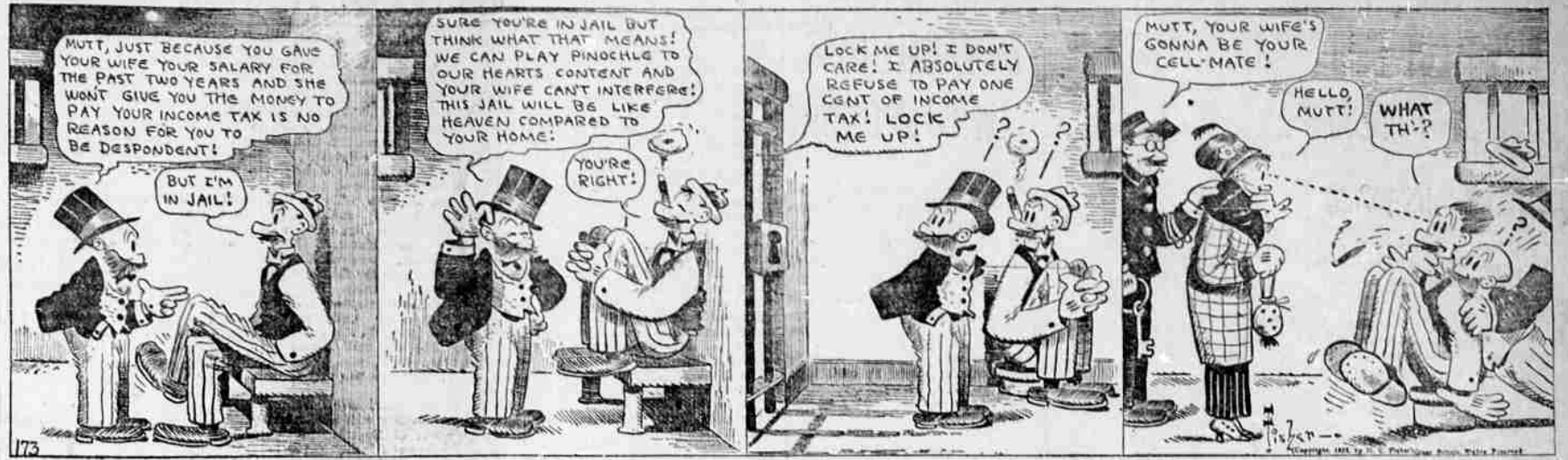
Today's Cross-Word Puzzle

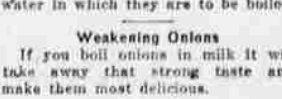

Radio Programs

KPFV, operated by the West Hollywood Radio shop, Hollywood, Cal., went on the air with their 100 watt station, broadcasting on 208 meters, Saturday, March 14. This station is notable in that it uses batteries exclusively with no generators. A big group of moving picture stars participated in the opening program, which started at 8 o'clock and lasted until midnight.

Four months ago, the word "radio" signified to the average person in America only a newspaper expression, often used to describe the latest craze that had hit America. Today there is an antenna on almost every housetop, and thousands of loops are hidden away in the houses.
