

BANKERS' PART IN FARM PLANS GIVEN

Bankers of Eugene and Lane county will play an important part in the coming agricultural program of this district, O. S. Fletcher, county agent told 40 members of the Lane County Bankers' association at their meeting in the Osburn hotel last night. Financing of the various projects being planned will be an important feature of their success, he said.

Farm crops, dairying, horticultural work, general livestock, poultry, and rodent control were listed by the speaker as some of the major projects to be attempted. Alfalfa demonstrations, seed certification and cow testing must be carried on under this plan.

For farmers' wives courses in millinery, dressmaking, nutrition, etc., will be offered by outside specialists.

Arnold Collier, county club leader, told of the work now being done. Maurice Starbuck, president of the American institute of banking in Lane county, reported on the progress made. N. E. Glass of Cottage Grove, said that 25 educational talks have been made by bankers on banking practice, and that as many more were planned. The program committee for last night's meeting consisted of the presidents of three Eugene banks, Claude D. Rorer, W. W. Calkins and P. E. Snodgrass. Next week Robert Merrill of the First National bank, Charles Sigman of the Bank of Commerce and Clarence Lombard of the United States National bank will be in charge of the entertainment.

State Funds Here Not Large, Report

Withdrawal of state funds on deposit in various banks of Oregon will have but little effect in Eugene, according to local bankers who state that it is expected that not more than 10 per cent of the total state funds on deposit here will be withdrawn. The state treasurer has sent out notices that approximately \$1,750,000 would be withdrawn to pay interest on state bonds and for the retirement of highway bonds.

Because of the financial depression in eastern Oregon the state treasurer said the withdrawal of this money probably would work a hardship on some of the state depositors.

No announcement was made as to the amount of state money on deposit in Eugene but it is not large enough to cause any effect on the total bank resources here.

3000 PRESENT AT ARMORY SERVICE

It was estimated that 3000 were in attendance at the armory last night where the Demarest revival is in progress. Friday will be the last lecture for women only. These lectures have been so well received by the women of Eugene and country that the armory is always well filled. Her concluding topic will be "Motherhood" and the evangelist will have her three little children on the platform with her at the time.

The theme for last night was "Magdalene, or Vampire" and was taken from the seventh chapter of Luke. Some of the thoughts brought out by the evangelist were that Simon, the Pharisee, while pretending to be a very religious man, was an old hypocrite and had invited Jesus to take dinner with him that he might create a sensation in the city by having in his house one who was very much in the public eye. 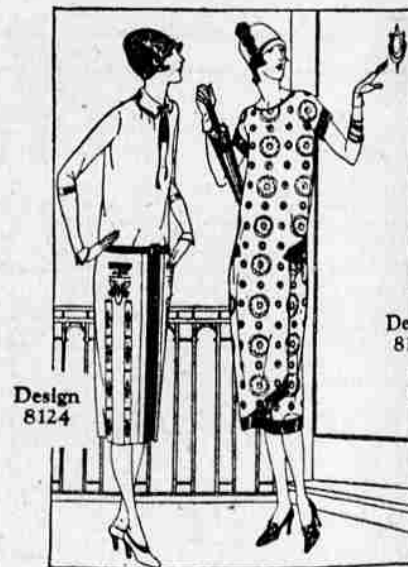
