

### KID M'COY FACES ADDED SENTENCE

LOS ANGELES, March 18.—Kid McCoy, former pugilist, recently sentenced to San Quentin for the slaying of Mrs. Theresa Moss here last August, today faced the prospect of having 38 years of imprisonment added to his term for manslaughter.

He was convicted in superior court yesterday on three counts of assault growing out of the pistol orgy which ended in Mrs. Moss' antique shop the morning after she died of a bullet wound in the apartment she and McCoy had been occupying.

One count of assault with a deadly weapon, carrying a penalty from 1 to 19 years imprisonment, concerned the wounding of W. J. Ross, who attempted to escape from the antique shop after McCoy had staggered in, drunk and disheveled, looking for Albert A. Moss, Mrs. Moss' divorced husband. The other two counts, charging assault with intent to murder and calling for penalties of from one to 14 years each, covered the wounding of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Schlapp in the same affray.

McCoy will be sentenced Friday, at which time, if Judge Crull sees fit to assess the penalties consecutively, the former prize fighter will be sentenced to a possible additional term of 38 years.

### Japanese Envoy Denies Report of Immigration Plan

WASHINGTON, March 18.—Reports that Tameo Matsudaira, the new Japanese ambassador to Washington had received instructions before leaving Tokyo to re-open the immigration question upon his arrival here was denied by the envoy.

His instructions, the ambassador said were purely of a general character designed to promote friendship between the two governments.

He added, however, that although the immigration question was regarded in the United States as settled forever, hope still was entertained in Japan that at some future date the problem might be taken up again and another solution found.

### Portland Hold-up Is Given ten Years

PORTLAND, Ore., March 18.—Ten years in the penitentiary was the sentence imposed here by Circuit Judge Tucker upon Joseph B. Ferraro, who was convicted of attacking T. A. Johnson, manager of the Panjangles theater here recently in an attempt to rob him of \$5,000 of the theater's money. Ferraro claimed to be a San Francisco pugilist, veteran of 250 ring battles. In a plea for clemency Ferraro produced letters to show that he had never been in trouble before and that he had aided San Francisco officers in enforcing the law.

### Mr. Rinehart Quits Tax Commission job

SALEM, Ore., March 18.—The resignation of T. A. Rinehart, as secretary of the state tax commission, has been received by the commission, effective April 1. Ralph Wirth, who is now in the employ of the department, was elected in his place.

Part of the duties of the secretary will be to assist in assembling data accumulating in a proposed investigator of assessment methods in the various counties of the state. The investigation was authorized by the 1925 legislature. To do the field work in the investigation, an appointee will be named later.

### HAROLD WILLIS ADMITS HE LIED

LOS ANGELES, March 18.—A boy who tried hard to make folks believe it was he who committed the murder for which his mother was sentenced to life imprisonment, today was just a boy again, having admitted to the district attorney that his "confession" was a lie forged to free his parent from the consequences of her crime. He was Harold "Sonny" Willis, 14-year-old son of Mrs. Margaret Willis, convicted slayer of Dr. Benjamin B. Baldwin.

"Sonny" announced about ten days ago that he killed Dr. Baldwin last April when the doctor attacked his mother and on the strength of his "confession" his mother's attorney won for her a stay of execution postponing her removal to San Quentin penitentiary. The same attorney after District Attorney Asa Keyes scoffed at the lad's story, swore out a complaint charging the boy with murder, and Harold was held for trial.

Sunday after a two-hour grilling Harold broke down and sobbed: "I was in school when Dr. Baldwin was killed. I knew nothing about it until later. I said I killed him to help my mother."

Mrs. Willis, who ten days ago corroborated her son's "confession," declined yesterday to discuss his repudiation of the "confession."
