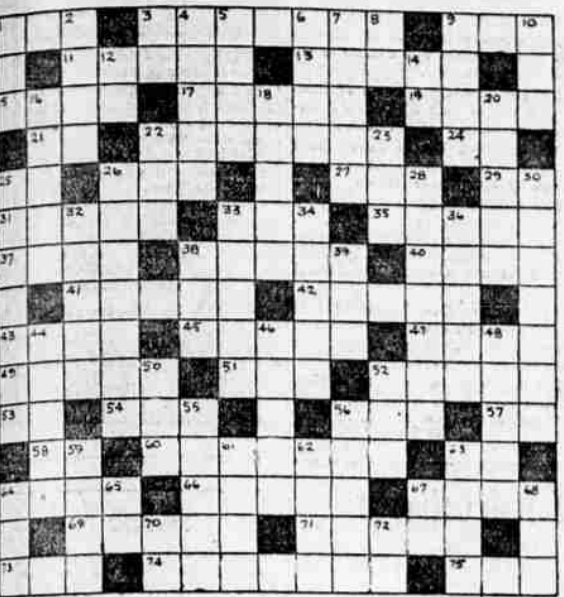


Today's Cross-Word Puzzle

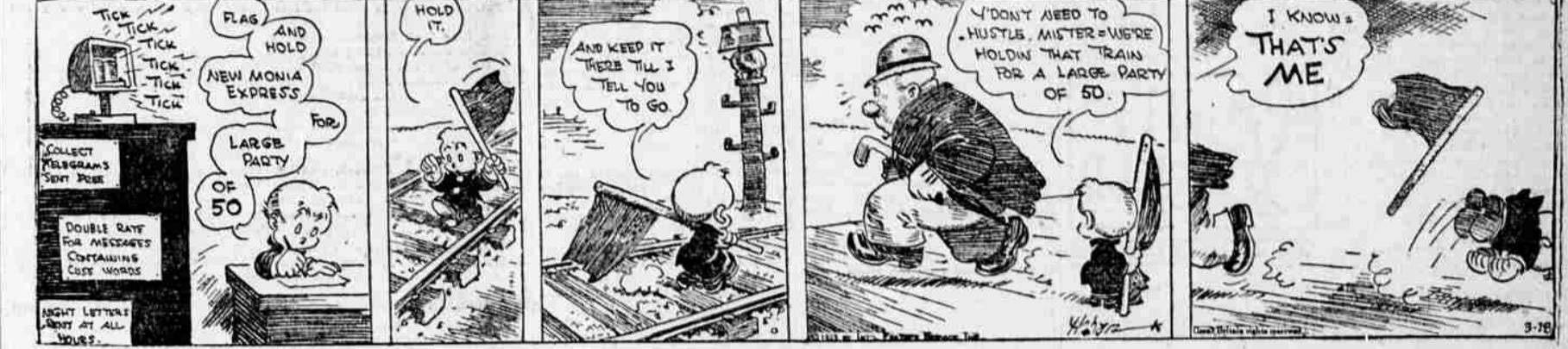

Home Hints

On Gardening

By design we attempt to create a harmonious whole and in the flower garden, as elsewhere, simplicity is of the greatest importance. Even in gardening style governs the design. There are two main styles into which all others can be analyzed—the informal and the formal.

Today's Styles



High colors are permissible in the formal garden and striking contrasts may be used. Plant the flowers in masses in either style using great quantities of one kind and grading them somewhat from high to low.
One may have certain colors predominating at different seasons, or possibly a less monotonous and more charming effect may be obtained by creating a harmonious garden of pink, using blue, white, lavender, pink, clear rose, a bit of dark maroon, a touch of royal purple, and a dash of sulphur yellow. Use them in the order in which they are given, using large quantities of blue, a little less of white, not as much lavender, a

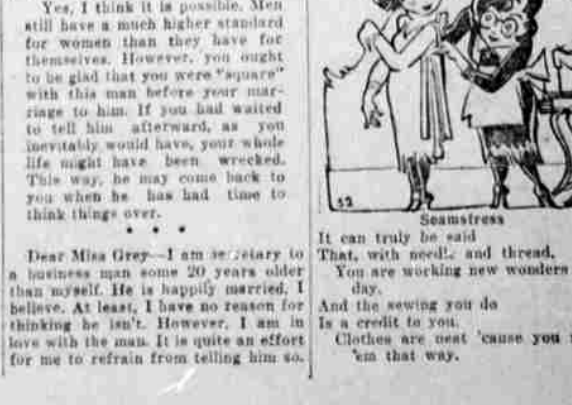
How are ya?
