

CARL WASHBURN TO BE COUNCILLOR OF U. S. CHAMBER

Carl G. Washburn has been named national councillor to represent the Eugene chamber of commerce in the chamber of commerce of the United States, according to announcement today.

The national council of the chamber of commerce of the United States consists of one representative each from the more than 1400 commercial and industrial organizations making up the national chamber's membership. It serves as an advisory body to the national chamber's board of directors.

The council holds a special meeting preceding the annual convention of the national chamber to pass on the program and to select a nominating committee. The councillors also act as chairmen of the delegates representing their organizations.

A councillor occupies a position of liaison officers between the national chamber and his own organization in important questions.

The chamber of commerce of the United States is the strongest commercial organization in the world. Its object is to encourage trade and commerce; increase the efficiency of American business organizations; to obtain uniformity and equity in business laws and to get proper consideration and concentration of opinion on questions affecting the financial, commercial, civic and industrial interests of the country at large.

A system of referendum operated by the chamber has met with unusual success in obtaining the viewpoint of business men on national questions. There are, when they point to the need of legislation or other governmental action, are transmitted to the government's executive officers and to congress by the national chamber's headquarters at Washington.

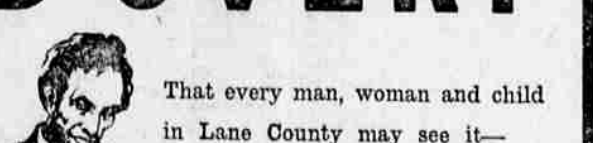

If the peddler's evil is to be eliminated merchants must organize and cooperate, and the public must be educated to offset the misrepresentations that peddlers employ, said Mr. Schnell.
