

MALCOLM MOODY OF THE DALLES DIES IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., March 20.—Malcolm A. Moody, 70, an ex-representative in congress from the eastern Oregon district, died at a hospital here last night.

Moody's home was in The Dalles. He came to Portland early in November.

A pioneer resident of The Dalles, Moody once served as mayor. He had large property holdings in Wasco county. He was elected to congress in 1896. The Celilo canal was built largely through his efforts. His father, Zeb Moody, was governor of Oregon from 1882 to 1886.

Mr. Moody was born in Linn county, near the present town of Brownsville, in November, 1855. The family moved to The Dalles in 1862, where Zeb Moody organized The Dalles city bank.

Two brothers, Zenas A. Moody of Ashland, Oregon, and Ralph Moody, an attorney of Washington, D. C., survive.

SAN BRUNO, Calif., March 20.—Preaching his way through school—

Only 24, he is a graduate law student at Stanford and a successful preacher in this town. Although not ordained he is more or less a full fledged preacher; at any rate he doubled the attendance of the Methodist church here in a couple of months.

His congregation wants him to stay on after finishing college. But Stanford is only preaching so that he can keep on studying to be a lawyer.

Oregon Statesman Interest is Sold

SALEM, Ore., March 20.—Announcement was made here today that Senator Fred J. Toole, of Oregon City has purchased the interest of John L. Brady in the Oregon Statesman, morning newspaper here. Brady came here a year and a half ago from Salina, Kansas. Mr. Toole has served at the last two sessions of the state legislature, representing Clackamas county in the senate. He was formerly in the newspaper business at Oregon City, as publisher of the Baumer-Courier.

DEFENSE RESTS IN DENNISTOUN CASE

LONDON, March 20.—The defense in the Dennistoun case rested today after Mrs. Dorothy Muriel Dennistoun had been recalled to testify regarding bills for dresses purchased in Paris.

She is suing her former husband, Lieutenant-Colonel Ian Ousley Dennistoun for money she alleges she loaned him prior to their divorce in 1921. After the divorce he married the widow of the Earl of Carnarvon.

The court said it proposed to submit to the jury several questions regarding the agreement which Mrs. Dennistoun said the colonel made in Paris at the time of their divorce, notably whether the agreement actually existed, whether it was collusive, whether both parties intended to give legal effect, and whether any of its conditions had been already fulfilled.

Arguments are expected to occupy today and part of Monday.

Norman Birkett, arguing for the defense, told the jury, the action had been brought because Mrs. Dennistoun saw an opportunity of getting money from Colonel Dennistoun, whom counsel described as "about as weak and vacillating an infatuated man as this jury ever heard or read of." He continued:

"Now that the story is out, the contention of the defendant that his was, in plain terms, blackmail, will be abundantly justified."

Sir Edward Marshall-Hall, principal counsel for the defense, has been forced to retire from the case because of illness, it was announced.

seemed almost surely his, kept it from him. Had he been born 50 years earlier he undoubtedly would have become prime minister. When he came to the threshold of that office, it was in 1923, the day of noble lords occupying No. 10 Downing street had set. Prime ministers no longer were nominated from the aristocracy, but from the commons.

Trained at Oxford.

Like many other young men who came to be statesmen of the British empire and peers of the realm, Lord Curzon was trained at Eton and Balliol college, Oxford.

Lord Curzon was born at Kedleston, January 11, 1859, the eldest son of Rev. Alfred Nathaniel Holden Curzon, the fourth Baron Scarsdale. He married twice, taking an American as his wife on both occasions.

In 1895 he married Miss Mary Victoria Leiter, daughter of L. Z. Leiter of Washington. She died in 1906, the year after they returned from India, leaving three daughters. His second wife, whom he married in 1917, was Mrs. Grace Elvina Hinds Duggan, a daughter of J. Monroe Hinds, who had been United States minister to Brazil and the widow of Alfred Duggan of Buenos Aires.

The travels of Lord Curzon and the books they engendered were recognized with a gold medal by the Royal Geographical society.

George L. Cleaver Submits Report of State Department

SALEM, Ore., March 20.—George L. Cleaver, who March 16 relinquished the office of state prohibition commissioner in favor of William S. Levens, who was appointed by Governor Pierre following the investigation of the department by the state legislature, today submitted to the governor a report covering the period from January 1 to March 16. It shows 32 prohibition and one narcotic cases closed; fines assessed for violations of the prohibition law, \$8100; jail sentences for violations of the prohibition law, 2905 days; jail sentences for violations of the narcotic act, 450 days; liquor and mash destroyed, 2633 gallons; opium taken, 8000 grains; stills taken, 10; automobiles confiscated, 4.

Nebraska Will be Drier Than Drier

OMAHA, Neb., March 20.—In ten days Nebraska will be drier than the driest bone dry state in the union, state officials predicted today.

The prediction was based on the effect of the celebrated "pint of liquor bill," which became a Nebraska law this morning when Governor McMullen signed the measure. The bill had passed both branches of the state legislature with large majorities.

Under provisions of the bill, possession of more than a pint of liquor will be prima facie evidence that its possessor is a bootlegger.

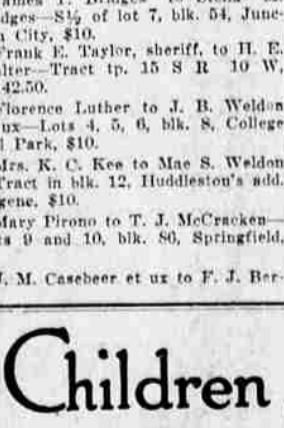
Mr. Dawes Plans To Present View
