Car of Lime Shipped—A car of lime for sweetening the soil in an experimental growth of Grimm alfalfa, ordered by the Eugene Farmers' co-operators, will arrive in Eugene Wednesday. It is used on the experimental alfalfa plots, and the remainder will be sold at cost to farmers desiring it for their soil.

Women to Meet—All women of the Baptist church will meet tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock, it was announced today. Work for the ensuing year will be outlined, and a missionary topic discussed. Science Hall Named—The new \$100,000 science building at the University of Oregon, which is expected to be ready for occupancy some time next term, will be named Condon hall in honor of Professor Thomas Condon, who taught at the university from 1876 to 1907, when he died. Professor Condon was one

LANE SCHOOL SOON TO FINISH COURSES

Pupils of the Minerva school district number 158 will complete their school work for the year next Friday, this being the first school in Lane county to start summer vacation and this announcement will bring envy to many children of the county who in most cases still have about two months of school ahead. The state law requires that an eight months course be held and that when this is completed vacation may start. There has been very little in the way of holidays for the dozen pupils of the Minerva school and they have earned their early vacation, according to E. J. Moore, county superintendent of schools. E. Timber Operations To be Stopped Soon

The timber sale in the Siuslaw national forest in the Umpqua Mills and Lumber company will probably last only two months more, it is reported by H. S. Shelley, supervisor of the forest, who has returned from a trip of inspection to that region. The company is taking out from 40,000 to 50,000 board feet of timber daily, which nets the government from \$75 to \$100 daily, according to Mr. Shelley. The region embraced under the sale is rapidly being cleared, and operations cannot last much longer than 60 days, he believes.
