

OREGON ARTISTS WILL BROADCAST TOMORROW NIGHT

Five artists, members of the University of Oregon school of music faculty, will present a musical program Tuesday evening, March 24, at 8:30, which will be broadcast by radio station KGW, Portland. The program will include piano and violin numbers, and vocal selections. Madame Rose McGrew, soprano; Jane Thacher, pianist; Mrs. Underwood, violinist; Aurora Potter, Underwood, pianist; and Louis Artau, pianist, are scheduled to appear.

Accomplished Artist.

Madame McGrew, professor of voice in the school of music, has studied under Heinrich and Van Kotzshne of Dresden; and Zimmerman, of Berlin. She has appeared in the Court theater, Mecklenburg-Schwerin, and the Royal theater, Hanover; and created the role of Octavian in Strauss' "Rosenkavalier."
Louis Artau, who will accompany Madame McGrew, joined the University faculty last fall. He has traveled extensively as a concert pianist and accompanist. Mr. Artau was a student at Johns Hopkins university, Lehigh university, the Bethlehem conservatory of music, and the Peabody conservatory of music in Baltimore; and has studied under Harold Randolph, Alfred Butler, and Frieda Trammell, in Vienna.

Mr. Underwood Appears.

Rex Underwood, professor of violin, who will appear with Mrs. Underwood (Aurora Potter Underwood) in a selection for piano and violin and also in a series of violin solos, studied at the Chicago musical college, at the Leipzig conservatory, and the Royal Bavarian school of music. He has been a pupil of Joseph Oleizer, Chicago; Michael Press, Berlin; and Ostrovsky, London. Mr. Underwood, who has been with the university since 1919, is director of the university orchestra. Mrs. Underwood is a graduate of the University of Oregon, receiving her B. M. in 1921. She has studied under Ethel Newcombe and Edwin Hughes, in New York, and has been connected with the university faculty as assistant professor of pianoforte since 1922.

Mrs. Thacher, professor of pianoforte at the school of music since 1917 is a concert pianist of wide reputation. She studied in Vienna, and has been a pupil of Karl Pflieger and Teodor Leschitzky.
