

### \$27,800 BUILDING PERMITS GRANTED

Yesterday's building total was \$27,800—the biggest day's business so far this month—announced W. H. Alexander, city building inspector. The total figure represents six new residences, one of which was at an estimated cost of \$7,000, and none of which fell lower than \$3,000.

Three of the permits were taken after 5 o'clock, the hour at which the office customarily closes.

M. O. Bessonet took out \$10,000 worth of permits, one for erection of a \$6,000 residence at 1695 Fairmount boulevard, and the other for a \$4,000 residence at 1807 Fairmount boulevard. Other permits were as follows:

### MANY EXPECTED AT TRAPSHOOT SUNDAY

Eugene will be the scene of a trapshoot next Sunday, March 29, similar to the one last month at which 50 shooters from all parts of the Willamette valley competed. It was announced today by Walt McCarnack, chairman of the committee putting on the shoot.

Fifty dollars in cash will be put up as added money for the shoot, and a large delegation from Corvallis has indicated they will be present to compete for the money. The shooting will take place at the traps on the municipal aviation grounds, and the Lane County Sportsmen's association is sponsoring the affair.

Posters were put up today announcing the entry fees in the various classifications, as each shooter will be classified according to his skill. Division of the prize money will be on a 40-30-20-10 basis, it is announced.

### Epidemic is Most Serious in History

SALEM, Ore., March 24.—An epidemic of influenza has struck the public schools here that is the most widespread of any epidemic in the history of the city. Statistics issued here by the high school authorities indicated that for the month ending March 20 the per centage of attendance of high school children was 91.1 per cent, over five per cent lower than normal, and the lowest for which any records are available.

Individually the cases are not so severe as in previous epidemics.

### A. H. McDonald Is Seriously ill

A. H. McDonald, owner of the Rex theater and the new McDonald-Schaefers building, who was stricken with pneumonia last Friday and taken to the Pacific Christian hospital, is still gravely ill, announced Dr. S. M. Kerron today.

The patient was slightly improved in the last 24 hours, the physician says, although he still has some critical stages of the disease to pass through.

of persons believed to have been incinerated at Murphyboro. The Red Cross announced that 2839 persons were injured. Property loss was estimated in the neighborhood of \$29,000,000.

Dead Accounted For.

Searching parties, returning from an all-day investigation of West Frankfort ruins, announced their belief that all dead there had been accounted for. Conditions are excellent. Mayor Hangle wired Governor Leu Small, in announcing that troops, with the exception of medical units, no longer were needed. At Murphyboro, work was in progress on hundreds of homes in the 132 blocks destroyed by the storm. The city was gladdened by the announcement that the Mobile and Ohio railroad shops, employing 1400 men, and another of its largest industries would be rebuilt.

Rehabilitation work also moved rapidly forward in Tennessee, Kentucky and Indiana. The death toll in the latter state, where Griffin and Owensville were razed and parts of Princeton destroyed, was raised to 112 today. Griffin, in which building operations have started is not suffering from the rising waters of the Wabash as one railroad to the town is in operation, but fears were expressed for families in a score of neighboring farm houses cut off by water from medical aid and food. The current was too swift for rowboats. The rural areas, however, were given two days supply of food on Sunday.

### TWILIGHT LEAGUE MEETING TONIGHT

First call for a meeting of the Eugene Twilight Baseball league was sounded today by W. W. (Dimp) Phares, president of the league last year. The meeting will be held in the assembly room of the chamber of commerce tonight at 7:30 o'clock, and all managers of teams, players and others interested in the league are invited to be present and take part in the discussion and plans.

The number of teams to enter the league, the diamond upon which the games will be played, plans for financing the organization and other matters will come up at the meeting tonight. Last year six teams composed the league, and played on a three-game weekly schedule for three months. Games were started in May.

The South Willamette baseball field used for games last year, will not be available this season, according to Mr. Phares, and suggestions are in order for another location. Teams last year represented the Standard Oil company, postoffice, hardware and sporting goods companies, garages, clothing stores, and bankers. The sporting goods team won the pennant.

### REBUILDING GOES ON WITH VIGOR

WASHINGTON, March 24.—Sales of the new Harding 1½¢ postage stamp and the new 1½¢ stamped envelope on March 19, the first day of their offering at the postoffice department's philatelic agency, amounted to \$2446, representing about 150,000 pieces. The sales were to stamp collectors who bought in blocks of six, 12 and even 100. Many asked that 1½¢ Washington stamped envelopes bearing in addition 1½¢ Harding stamps of the three methods of manufacture—now, rotary press at flat bed press, be mailed to them so as to bear the cancellation date of the first day of sale.

quarters would undoubtedly soon change that opinion.

"With the addition of the new truck, a piece of fire fighting equipment that is needed to keep pace with the growth of the city and provide all possible protection against fire, the quarters are congested to the point where there is hardly room enough to reach the trucks for the firemen to alarm sounds," Mr. Simmons states.

"Eugene is a growing city, there is no doubt of that, and the growth according to present indications shows no signs of abating. Building is increasing rapidly, especially in the business district and money spent for additional fire protection is as absolutely necessary by a municipality, such as this, as insurance on a home or business," the councilman said.

Although the city, with the new fire truck, is now well able to take care of present needs in the way of protection from fire, enlarged facilities for the housing of this equipment in order that it may be worked to its highest efficiency is urgently needed and this is the reason that the city council recommended that the bond issue of \$10,000 be placed on the ballot at the special election, Mr. Simmons said.
