SARATOSA, Fla., March 24.—(AP)—John G. McGraw, veteran manager of the New York Giants, has concluded that the team he will lead into the pennant race is a "good young club" and that it has plenty of reserve strength.

"I have tried both systems," says Manager Hendricks of the Cincinnati club, "and believe two sessions daily for the better method."

"In favoring such a plan I have explained to my players that we are not going to get Florida weather on the way north or after the opening of the season. That's reason number one."

"After starting our exhibition games I do not intend that the players shall do any work but the playing of the game. For that reason, I have impressed upon them the importance of the two daily workouts."

Fred Elton, of the Horton fish hatchery has purchased a car.

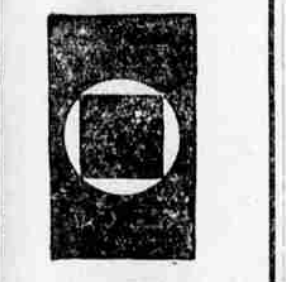
