

EDMUND CAMPBELL WILL BE DISTRICT ROTARY GOVERNOR

PORTLAND, Ore., March 25.—Rotarians of district number 1, including the Pacific northwest and British Columbia, who finished the business of their annual convention late yesterday, were today engaged in their annual golf tournament. Portland Rotarians won the cup in 1923 and 1924, and if they win today will possess the cup permanently.

Victoria, B. C., won the next convention of district number 1. Gene Eby captured the attendance contest cup; second prize went to Mount Vernon, Wash., Astoria, Ore., third, and Nelson, B. C., fourth. Vancouver, B. C., won the stunt cup for its pageant "The Golden Dawn," which was presented Monday night.

MR. CAMPBELL CHOSEN

PORTLAND, Ore., March 25.—Edmund W. Campbell, president of the Seattle Rotary club and a prominent figure in the activities of district No. 1, was nominated as governor of the district at the closing business session of the twelfth annual Rotary convention.

Mr. Campbell will not be formally elected until the sessions of the international convention to be held in Cleveland, Ohio, starting June 15. He won the office in contest with W. V. Wells of Astoria, Wash., receiving 52 votes to 45 for Mr. Wells.

Mr. Campbell succeeds Frank C. Riggs of Portland. He will take office July 1.

Drop Reported on Jail Record Book

Only 22 inmates are enrolled on the guest register of the Lane county jail and J. L. Lee, jailer, reports that this is the lowest mark that the population has reached in about a year.

The county is very well behaved at present and crime is at a low ebb, Sheriff Taylor avers.

PHONE GRANTS FOR STATE ROUTE FILED

Permits for the construction, operation and maintenance of telephone lines of the Cascade forest service along the McKenzie highway were filed today at the office of the county clerk. These lines will be the same as erected under the franchise which has been in effect with Lane county for the past 12 to 14 years. Several sections of the highway taken over by the state required that a permit from the state highway commission was necessary. The permit is for a period of 10 years.

The sections included in the grant are Thurston-Walterville; Walterville-Deerhorn; Doyle Hill grade; Shell Rock grade; Blue River.

Practically the same arrangement in the way of restrictions on height of poles and clearance and other requirements as are included in the agreement with the county are contained in the grant from the state commission.
