

REPLACEMENT IN TORNADO AREA IS AIM OF RED CROSS

CHICAGO, March 26.—Reconstruction and replacement were the subjects of activity today in the storm swept areas of five states where a week ago rains and death were left in the wake of the previous day's tornado.

The American Red Cross went on today with its plans to replace and reconstruct homes, clothing and all necessities of victims to re-establish them as nearly as a pre-disaster basis as possible. Local community and county committees began the work of cooperating with the Red Cross in assessing claims. A few more days will end the emergency relief period and by Red Cross officials as the work for temporary efforts and work will start at once or surveys to ascertain permanent needs of storm sufferers. Later, provision will be made for vocational training and most fund assistance in cases where the chief means of support of a family was cut off by the disaster. The total deaths in the storm area today are estimated at 830. The figure set in the Associated Press lists of the killed on the night of the tornado.

YOUNG M'CORMICK TRIES HARD WORK

MILWAUKEE, Wis., March 26.—In a \$1 a week room here Fowler M'Cormick, 27-year-old grandson of the founder of the International Harvester fortune declared last night that he is learning, not earning, his way.

Each day the heir to the M'Cormick millions—less \$1 five and for ten hours works as a common laborer in the Milwaukee plant of the harvester company, filling metal pipe in the furnace carts, going from department to department, becoming acquainted.

For several weeks young M'Cormick has been working, living quietly in his South Side rooming house. A small room, containing an iron bed, two chairs and a dresser, has been his home.

His presence and occupation came to light yesterday through Fifi Potter Hillman, wife of the former president of the National City Bank of New York, who came to Milwaukee early this week. Yesterday she admitted that she had come to see her "god son" and last night, the two had dinner at a downtown hotel.

4-L Agrees With Four-day Plans

SPRINGFIELD, March 26.—(Special)—The conference committee of the Springfield local 70 of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, has agreed to accept the Booth-Kelly lumber company's proposal of curtailment of operations to a four-day week, according to a bulletin posted at the Springfield mill this morning. The statement is signed by George Harsen, chairman, L. May and George Cox. The new arrangement of the schedule begins this evening. Curtailment is stated to be the "only solution to the present problem that confronts the industry."

Conferences Favor Church Unification

CHICAGO, March 26.—(Special)—Fourteen conferences of the Methodist Episcopal church have voted in favor of unification with the Methodist Episcopal church, South, Dr. B. J. Wade, secretary of the general conference of the northern church, announced here today. The question of unification is before the annual conference throughout the church and will not be completed for some time.

Ministerial votes cast by the 14 conferences showed 911 in favor of unification to 361 votes against. At the day electoral conference the vote was 559 for and six against unification.

PRINCE OF WALES TO SAIL SATURDAY

PLYMOUTH, Eng., March 26.—(Special)—Everything is in readiness aboard H. M. S. Repulse for the Prince of Wales' voyage to South Africa and South America, beginning Saturday. The grim battle cruiser has been scrubbed and polished until she looks like a jeweled ship, with brass and nickel blazing in the sun and her decks and sides spotless.

The twelfth successive man of war to bear that name under the Union Jack, the Repulse will be the crack ship of His Majesty's fleet during the time the prince is aboard, only the best of officers and tars have been chosen to accompany the prince and every day life on board while Wales' standstill is at the foremost will be a display of rigid discipline and tidiness.

When other craft dip their flags in salute they will be paying homage to a living example of the splendor of Britain's sea power—a fighter 794 feet long, of 38,000 tons, carrying a main battery of six 15 inch guns and a crew of 1250 men with 7000000 worth of hurling the whole mass through the water at 32 knots an hour.

At the time the prince is aboard he plans to carry a daily program of gymnastics in much the same manner as he occupies himself while at St. James palace. His quarters on the Repulse will contain a gymnasium, bedroom, bath, and smoking room.

The gymnasium, a virtual reproduction of the one at the palace, with the addition to the usual apparatus of a mechanical horse, to substitute for the lightning rides in which Wales has indulged extensively this year.

"Any thing will do for sleeping quarters," the prince said, "but I want a complete gymnasium handy."

Polish Divorces Cause of Alarm

WARSAW, March 26.—The discovery that 20,000 Polish Catholic couples have obtained divorces by joining the Russian orthodox church is causing concern to the Polish government, which is considering measures to restrict the movement.

The Russian church shares the Polish objections to the practice and has instructed all the church authorities to handle divorce cases with the greatest care, refusing to consider any case if the parties have belonged to the church for less than a year.

Bachelor's Cooking School Established

LONDON, March 26.—Bachelors are being taught to cook at a school opened recently at Battersea, one of the London boroughs. The purpose of the authorities is to show unmarried men how to help themselves, and be a bit more independent of the restaurants. The teacher is a woman.
