

LUMBER BUSINESS ABOVE PRODUCTION

One hundred and twenty-one mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending March 21, manufactured 101,337,293 feet of lumber; sold 104,801,160 feet, and shipped \$8,928,551 feet.

New business was 3 per cent above production. Shipments were 14 per cent below new business.

Thirty-four per cent of the new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 35,922,480 feet of which 21,722,480 feet was for domestic cargo delivery and 14,200,000 feet export. New business by rail amounted to 2,008 cars.

Thirty-three per cent of the lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 29,809,871 feet, of which 17,435,483 feet moved coastwise and intercoastal; and 12,444,388 feet export. Rail shipments totaled 1,774 cars.

Local auto and team deliveries totaled 6,885,650 feet.

Unfilled domestic cargo orders totaled 143,404,447 feet. Unfilled export orders 100,293,228 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders 5,484 cars.

In the first twelve weeks of the year, production reported to West Coast Lumbermen's association has been 1,100,492,202 feet; new business 1,117,242,870 feet; and shipments 1,153,653,017 feet.

Legion Gives \$100 To Scout Council

The fund for carrying on Boy Scout work in Eugene was swelled by \$100, voted by the Eugene post of the American legion last night. This was the first cash contribution made to the scout council by any Eugene organization since its organization.

NEW DRUG COMPANY ELKS ARRANGE FOR PORTLAND SESSION

Formal opening of the new Eugene Drug store in the McDonald-Schaefer building will take place early next week. It is announced by the managers, S. R. Stevenson and E. A. Stacks. Although the wall cases and equipment are in place, and a small amount of merchandise is now being sold, open house will not be officially declared in the new store until next week.

The store is equipped with made-to-order English wall cases, with marble base boards. The color scheme in decorating is warm gray, with tiled-effect linoleum. The prescription room is behind swinging doors, with a large plate-glass window separating the room from the main store, so as to give the public a full view of the compounding work while it is going on. A large balcony with railing around the entire room provides space for additional stock.

A Marinello Beauty shop, to be operated by Mrs. B. Piper Bell, occupies the rear of the balcony. Four rooms, with built-in conveniences and arched openings, are used by this department, which is reached by a stairway on the north wall.

A small room at the south side of the prescription room will be used for fitting belts, shoulder braces and other appliances. The new store represents an investment of \$10,000 to \$12,000, and is one of the most thoroughly and artistically arranged drug stores in the Willamette valley.

Portland is making systematic preparations for the housing of the national convention of the Elks next July, according to J. A. McLean, manager of the O'Brien hotel, who has returned from Portland where he attended the Rotary district meeting.

"The housing is entirely in the hands of the committee of B. P. O. E. and all hotel owners have turned over their reservations to this committee with the exception of a few held out for their own use," Mr. McLean said. "The Eugene lodge has a large suite at the Imperial hotel where headquarters will be maintained and this will assure the local lodge ample accommodations as a gathering place."

"As far as possible the lodge will be grouped in hotels according to states so that these various units may be together. The housing committee's plan of assignment of rooms includes all hotels of the city as well as many private homes that will provide accommodations for one or more of the visiting Elks," Mr. McLean said.

Mr. McLean states that the handling of the hotel accommodations for a national convention, such as that of the B. P. O. E. is a task of much difficulty and involves a mass of detail work so that there will be no duplication of reservations or disappointments to those who believe that their reservations have been made.

Indians may Fish On Reservations

SALEM, Ore., March 27.—Indians of the Umatilla reservation in Umatilla county do not need fishing licenses as long as they confine their angling to the reservation, according to an opinion of Attorney General Van Winkle in reply to an inquiry by the state game commission. They are held not to be under state regulation while fishing in streams on the reservation.

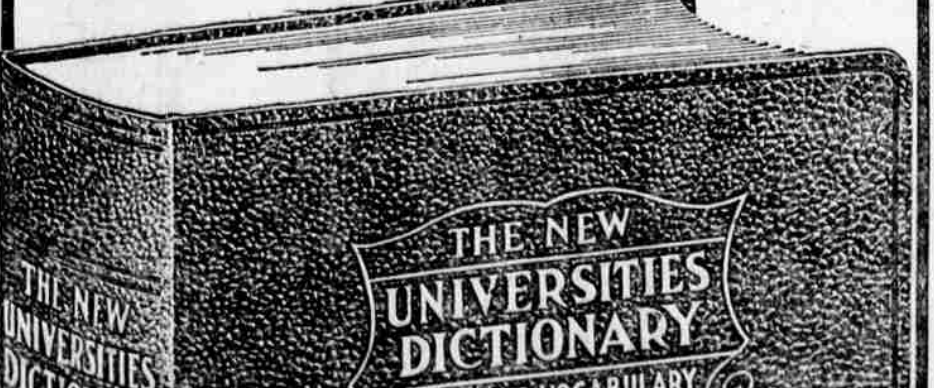
