

EXHUMATION MADE IN SHEPHERD CASE TODAY AT CHICAGO

CHICAGO, March 27.—(AP)—A second exhumation in connection with the McClintock death mysteries was made when the body of Dr. Oscar Olson, who died three years ago, was raised from the grave today for an autopsy and coroner's inquest.

A third exhumation was to be made later and the body of Mrs. Emma Nelson McClintock, who died 18 years ago, was to be raised.

These bodies are to be submitted to the same chemical tests for evidences of poison or other causes of unnatural death as in the case of William Nelson McClintock, the orphan millionaire, who it is charged in an indictment, was murdered by William D. Shepherd, the youth's foster-father and heir by a will, and by C. C. Faiman, head of a school of science with the inoculation of typhoid germs.

Mrs. McClintock, mother of the youth, was a widow and asked Shepherd and his wife to live with her and her son. When she died she left the boy in their care.

EUGENE BUILDERS LAND CITY JOBS

Eugene contractors were favored by the city council in awarding bids of the South Willamette sewer projects, and four proposed alley improvements at their special meeting yesterday afternoon.

Argument over the type of pipe line for the sewer in the College Hill district as to whether it should be concrete or vitrified pipe, took so much of the council's time that several of the items of business to be discussed had to be postponed until next Monday's meeting.

Contracts for the bridges across the millrace at Hillard and Patterson streets were not let, as there appeared to be a lack of money on hand to build them. There was a \$11 difference between the prices of the two low bidders, Haynes Brothers of Eugene, \$4980 and Oaks Construction company of Portland, \$4900.

Fred Smith, attorney, urged that the vitrified pipe be used for the work, and Howard Hall defended the concrete pipe, manufactured locally. Finally Mayor Parks ruled that the dispute was a matter to be settled between the contractor and the petitioners, and the majority of property owners could demand the type of pipe they wanted.

Contractors awarded the various projects were as follows:

- Sewer construction between Oak and Pearl streets, and Seventeenth and Twenty-fourth avenues (lower section of South Willamette sewer project), Stien Brothers, \$3188.
- Sewer construction, between Willamette and Lincoln streets, and Twenty-first and Twenty-fourth avenues (the College Hill section of the South Willamette sewer project), Oscar Snow, \$13,022.75.
- Grading and graveling the alley between Oak and Pearl streets, from Fifteenth to Sixteenth avenues, A. C. Mathews, \$285.75.
- Paving the alley between Oak and Pearl streets, from Sixth to Seventh avenues, George W. Hord, \$2247.
- Paving the alley between Sixth and Seventh avenues, from the alley east of Willamette street to Oak street; Oscar Snow, \$665.80.
- Grading and graveling the alley between Nineteenth and Twentieth avenues, from Olive to Charleston streets; A. C. Mathews, \$495.

WASHINGTON, March 27.—Attended by a naval guard of honor the body of Admiral George Dewey, hero of Manila bay, will be moved from Arlington national cemetery tomorrow or Monday and placed in Bethlehem chapel of the national cathedral here.

The removal was requested by the widow of Admiral Dewey who announced that George G. Dewey of Chicago, son of the admiral, had concurred.

GERM CASES ARE RECALLED BY PROBE

Murders With Germs Are Rare, is Declaration; McClintock Probe Brings Back Memories of Other Situations, Somewhat Similar.

CHICAGO, Ill., March 27.—Germs! Terrible, subtle, cowardly weapons of murder! Yet germ murders are rare. Three proven cases are of record.

These will be closely investigated by state and defense attorneys in the death of William McClintock, "millionaire orphan," for whose death William Shepherd and Dr. C. C. Faiman have been indicted.

Of all possible methods of malicious homicide, the administration of disease germs is most apt to excite the imagination.

Victim Defenseless.
Against no other attack is the unarmed victim so defenseless.

Some of the most intricate and dramatic trials in history have occurred in connection with poison cases.

One such, still less than a decade old, is recalled.

Dr. Arthur Warren Waite was a young and promising dentist of New York city. He lived with his young wife in an up-to-date residential neighborhood.

He was socially acceptable and had won some distinction as a tennis player.

Friends Believed in Innocence.
When he was accused of having murdered his wife's father and mother by administering to them doses of poison and disease germs his numerous acquaintances were incredulous and angry.

But he was arrested and in court under oath he unfolded an amazing story of bacteria, poisons and ingenious murder plots as no sane fictionist would have dared to invent.

In September, 1915, Dr. Waite married Miss Clara Peck, daughter of J. E. Peck, wealthy retired druggist of Grand Rapids, Mich.

Soon after New Year's the bride's parents visited their daughter in New York. The health of the elder Mrs. Peck failed, and on January 30, 1916, she died, supposedly of Bright's disease.

Dr. Waite accompanied the body to Grand Rapids and arranged the funeral. Then J. E. Peck began to fail, and six weeks later, March 12, he died.

Again the doctor went to Michigan with the body. He suggested cremation but the family refused. A mysterious note asked the family to have an autopsy performed. This was done, and led to the arrest and confession of Dr. Waite.

Pays With His Life.
He had committed the murders, he said, to place his wife in possession of her parents' fortune. He was electrocuted at Sing Sing.

A dramatic story of crime and

intrigue was disclosed in the arrest in Paris of "Gentleman" Girard, his wife Madame Jeanne Girard, and a friend, Mademoiselle Josephine Doucet.

Girard died awaiting trial. His wife and friend were sentenced to 20 years imprisonment.

Girard had supported the women in luxury for years. He was an insurance agent, who in spare time studied bacteriology.

His procedure in crime was always the same. He cultivated acquaintances, ingratiated himself into their friendship and sold them insurance.

The policy would be taken out in the victim's name, but Girard would forge his acceptance and application, and using an assumed name for a beneficiary.

Insurance Collected.
Then taking advantage of a meal in common, he dosed his victims with one of his strange alkaloid germs or infected them with the germs of disease—typhoid or pneumonia. As soon

as his victim died, he would collect the insurance.

A recent germ poisoning attempt which did not end fatally for the victim was the efforts of Clarence O. Baring of New York to poison his wife.

Mrs. Baring, a witness against her husband, told of quarrels over her husband's devotion to another woman. On Baring's plea for forgiveness they became reconciled.

Returning from a trip to Europe, Mrs. Baring became ill.

Kansas City police in 1909 accused a man of attempting to kill a relative by use of typhoid germs but the man was never convicted.

Agriculture Faces Prosperous Year, Says Mr. Capper

CHICAGO, March 27.—Senator Capper of Kansas, here enroute to his home from Washington sees prospects of a prosperous year for agriculture—a business revival when farmers market the next crop and come back for the cattle industry within a year.

"If we have only a fair crop and a good price the farmers will be in fine shape this year," he said. "His financial improvement last season did not apparently result in the increased buying power many were looking for. The reason was that the farmer got rid of his debts, his bank debts and back taxes, and this took much of his increased revenue."

"Economists who have studied the situation thoroughly agree that the cattle industry will be on a prosperous footing within the next year or so. This means a great deal, for in recent years, it has been in extremity, and many wealthy gentlemen with great herds in the west have had their fortunes wiped out."

The climate of Oregon is especially conducive to fine wool weaving. In many Eastern plants artificial methods have to be used to keep the air moist to make the wool card, spin and weave properly.

The Superintendent of the Woolen Mills has devoted his life to woolen goods manufacturing.
