

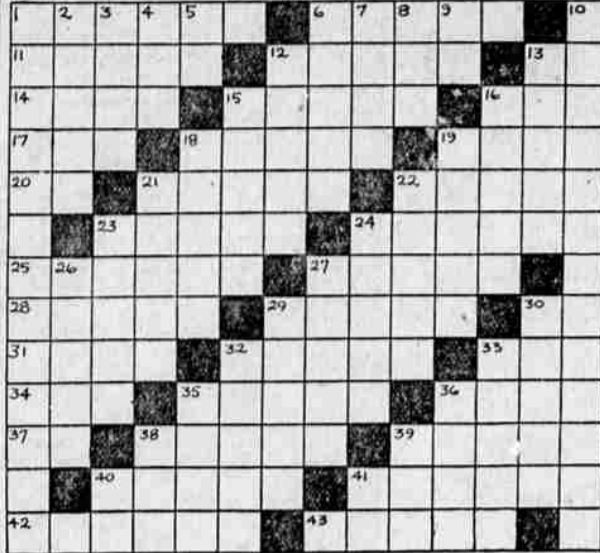
EUGENE STUDENTS AT OREGON EARN HIGH TERM MARKS

One Eugene student, at the University of Oregon, Orlando J. Hoelis, a sophomore taking a pre-law course, and two Portland students, Elsie F. Dennis, a senior majoring in history, and Hazel Borders, senior, majoring in normal arts, received no grades less than I for the term which ended March 20, according to the grade sheet issued by the university registrar's office. A grade of I indicates a highly satisfactory quality of work, there being but one higher grade possible—that of "honors" in a given subject, which must be applied to by the student at the beginning of the year.
