

EUGENE-FLORENCE HIGHWAY BIDS ARE CALLED BY STATE

PORTLAND, Ore., March 28.—Completion of the Dalles-California highway, the John Day highway, and the Roosevelt coast highway through Curry county in 1936 was decided upon by the state highway commission at the session which closed last evening.

A number of projects were ordered to be completed by the meeting April 25.

The Florence highway, Blachly road, grading and surfacing, two miles one-half miles.

Coquima county, Pacific highway, paving approaches to Robert A. Lynch bridge, near Winchester.

Klamath county—Big hill section on Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway, grading nine miles. Survey ordered from Lakeview on other sections of the highway not built.

The Dalles-California highway, from Deschutes county line to Crescent, grading.

Willow county, Enterprise-Flora highway, grading seven miles north from Enterprise.

Lincoln county, Roosevelt highway, grading from Newport to Agate Beach.

Curry county, Roosevelt coast highway, grading from Rogue river through town of Gold Beach to Hunter creek.

Linn county, grading fourteen miles between Albany and Lebanon.

Old Oregon Trail, resurfacing 25 miles between Baker and Telocost.

MAIL RUSH STARTS BEFORE INCREASES

"We are having a big rush of advertising matter through the mails at present and this is expected to show a steady increase until April 15," according to Darwin E. Moran, postmaster, who reports that many who use the postal service for third class matter are hurrying to take advantage of the present low rate before the increase to take effect at midnight, April 14.

"All third class mail matter turned in at the postoffice before midnight will go at the present rate but after that the increased postage will be necessary and advice is being given that in order to avoid delay that the new regulations be carefully studied by those sending third class mail," the postmaster said.

A big demand is being made for the present one-cent envelopes to be used while the rate is in effect as the price goes to one and one-half cents under the new rules, Mr. Moran states. The new stamps one-half and one and one-half cents will soon be here.

Water Rights for Railroads Sought

The other application is from the Southern Pacific company to appropriate water from an unnamed creek for locomotive and railroad purposes at a cost of \$7000. The railroad companies also applied for water rights in several other counties traversed by the lines, according to word received from Salem.

The company will buy, sell and handle wood and lumber products, and particularly the making and distribution of wooden handles.
