

'TEX' RICKARD IS FINED BY JUDGE

NEWARK, N. J., March 29.—George L. "Tex" Rickard, nationally known fight promoter today was fined \$5,000 by Federal Judge Bodine for conspiracy to violate the law regarding transportation of prize fight films. Rickard and four co-defendants were convicted in federal court in Trenton on March 19, on the charge, which was brought in connection with transportation of the Dempsey-Arputner fight films.

All five men were in court to receive sentence. Fines were given the four other convicted men as follows: Fred Quimby, New York, motion picture producer, \$7,000; Jasper C. (Jap) Mamma, Washington and New York newspaper man, \$7,000; Teddy Hayes, of Los Angeles, former secretary to

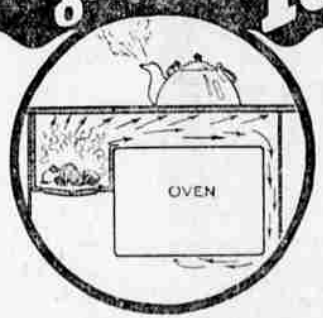

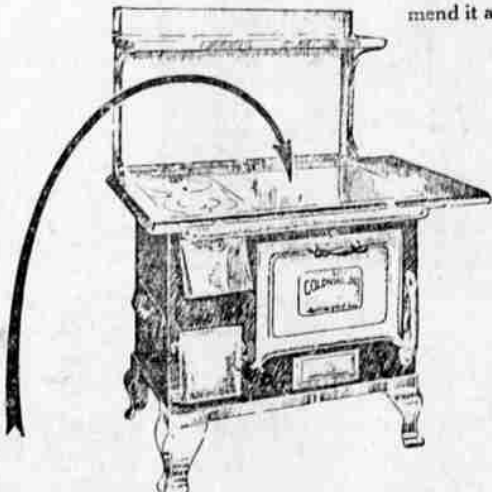
