BOND ISSUE FOR WATER IS URGED

ways the hazard that an accident might close the works and with the draining off of the supply of water from the present storage facilities there would be a serious result immediately," the report states.

"We are asking the people of Eugene to vote this additional bond issue of \$135,000 to provide against any such water famine and also to meet the ever increasing demand for extension of service due to the growth of the city."

Big Mains Planned.

The proposed system as laid out on the recently completed survey includes the installation of two 12-inch mains as feeders that will reach to practically all parts of the city as they will tie in with the present system of mains, many of the present lines being six to eight inch pipes. This heavy pressure that will result means a greatly increased protection against fire, it is pointed out.

One of the proposed feeders will run from the pumping plant along Sixth avenue to Pearl street, north to Fifth avenue, west to Charnelton street, north to Fourth avenue and west to Madison. This will provide heavy water pressure for a large and growing residence area north and northwest of Skinner butte. In case of fire in this area at present water would be drawn from a two and one-

half inch main and the pipes would be pumped dry in a short time by the fire apparatus, the report states.

Benefit Is Told.

This new main will not only be of great benefit to the many adjacent streets but it is laid out so that it can be co-ordinated with mains farther south and increase the water pressure throughout the area as far as Eleventh avenue west and west of Monroe street. A connection can also be made with the present Blair boulevard main. This one 12-inch main will provide pressure sufficient for any demands of the present and for some time to come and for several hundred blocks will give a fire protection that under present conditions is inadequate.

Another of the proposed high pressure mains will run south from the pumping plant on Patterson street as far as Seventeenth avenue east. This main will raise the pressure throughout the area traversed and connect with the present heavy 10-inch main that provides for a large district beyond Thirteenth avenue east and out University and Alder streets.

All City Benefits.

This Patterson street main is planned so that it will be connected west across the city with the O'Jee Creek reservoir and the lines from the north connecting with the end of the proposed feeder that will terminate at Fourth avenue and Madison street. This system will provide a closed circuit with high pressure 12-inch mains as feeders at each end practically encircling all of the city giving a greatly increased pressure and meeting present demand and providing for the increase in number of homes, it is stated.

"These proposed heavy pressure

mains are in reality parts of the water storage system and are dependent on the erection of the proposed reservoir on the east end of Skinner butte to replace the present inadequate storage facilities there. This reservoir which is urgently needed will assure that Eugene instead of having less than two days water supply on hand will have at least five at all times," the report explains.
