BOND PROPOSALS TO BE DISCUSSED

A mass meeting for the discussion of the city bonding proposals has been called for Wednesday evening, April 1, by the East Eugene Improvement Association. The meeting will be held in the Fairmont Presbyterian church at 7:30 o'clock.

Three talks have been scheduled by the program committee, with a selection of speakers best able to give brief, definite explanations of the various bond issues to be voted on. Mayor E. B. Parks has promised the committee to be on hand to discuss the incinerator and sewer; Carl G. Washburne has accepted the invitation to explain the city hall and fire apparatus; and J. W. McArthur, to whom has been assigned the subject of the water issues, has agreed to give an explanation of the specific features proposed.

The East Eugene Improvement Association, which includes in its membership all those living in the city east of University street, has arranged this meeting because of the great interest of everyone in the bond issues. A brief business session will take up the confirmation of committee appointments and several significant items of the year's program.

Dr. E. T. Hodge, president of the association, will preside.

Associated oil to Operate Tomorrow

Associated Oil company will begin distribution tomorrow morning, announced Hugh McCommon, manager. Work is not entirely complete on the plant at Second avenue west and Ninth boulevard, but business will begin before construction ends, it is stated.

The company will operate six men and three trucks, two of which are tank type with 1100 gallon capacity each. The third is a flatbed freight truck. No filling stations will be operated by the company, which expects to do only a wholesale business in this section.

MAYOR EXPLAINS NEED OF BONDS

passed and we all know from experience that hard surface pavement is by far the cheapest road construction taking it over a period of years. The macadam and gravel streets were ample when the slow moving steel tire vehicles were in use, but now we must build for the motor traffic.

"Nothing is as necessary as sanitation in a city of our class. Therefore we are again asking you to revote the \$500,000 sewer bonds that were voted last year, but upon finding a legal technicality, we must vote them again. It was the purpose of the city council to take a portion of this money and start work on the drainage of low lands that pass through the central part of our city and pick up the over congested sewer systems in Fairmount.

"We also voted last year \$25,000 for fire apparatus which was purchased and which we now have but this issue like the sewer bonds were found irregular and we are again asking the people to ratify their former action. Fire protection we must have, and with our present machines Eugene is enjoying an insurance rate that is as low as any city in Oregon. Now in connection with our fire apparatus we are asking for \$10,000 for repairs on city hall.

Repair Need Told.

"The city hall belongs to the people and the original cost was \$40,000. How can we as good citizens for the want of a few thousand dollars let this property depreciate in value. We would not think of doing so with our homes, so why our city hall? At this time I am going to ask every taxpayer in Eugene to visit the city hall and see for yourselves if you do not honestly think that \$10,000 expended on repairs would not be a good investment.

"The garbage question is one that we all should be most vitally interested in for it means health and if we do not have a healthy city we none of us want to reside therein. The open dump ground is a great breeder of flies and rodents and they are the best agents that are known to science to spread pestilence and disease, so let us vote the \$25,000 for the modern way of disposing of our refuse by burning same, thereby eliminating all hazards. The \$9000 bond for paving University avenue and 18th avenue should carry as it is a needed improvement with no way of assessing same to property.

"The water board of the city is

calling for two bond measures, one for \$120,000 for new reservoir and mains and one for \$375,000 for McKenzie river water. These measures should carry by a large majority for as I have stated before if Eugene continues to grow in homes, business houses and manufacturing plants we must extend our mains and have ample reservoir storage, both for domestic use and fire protection.

"This is your city and it is the duty of every citizen that has a vote, to exercise that right on April 15 next and make Eugene the second city in Oregon," the mayor stated.

Eugene Rotary club stands fourth among its class in district number 1 for attendance during the month of February, according to announcement of Carl G. Washburne, president of the club. The percentage of attendance was 94.28 for the month. COUNCIL CUTS OFF TWO FROM PAYROLL

Declaring that economy demanded immediate action, the city council wielded the knife on appropriations for the United States employment office and the city milk inspector's office at its meeting last night. The amounts lopped off were \$43 a month for the employment office and \$40 a month for milk inspection.

Rebent to be paid hereafter by the school board for its offices on the top floor of the city hall will be \$50 instead of \$15 a month; and the water board will pay \$75 instead of \$95 a month, the council decided.

The new wooden bridges across the millrace at Hilyard and Patterson streets will be built by the Olds Construction company for \$4900, it was voted, when it was reported there was sufficient money in the city coffers to build the structures.

Plumbers in order to be permitted permits by the city building inspector, must produce a state registration certificate, it was decided. This amendment to the city ordinance is in harmony with a state plumbing law passed at the last session of the legislature.
