

### COUNTY WILL OPEN CAMPAIGN AGAINST NONLICENSED DOGS

Lane county dog owners have until April 10 to obtain a county license for their animals and after that time the law will be taken against those who fail to obey the law. This is the edict of the county court today following numerous complaints about the large number of sheep being killed by dogs. Several of the Granges of the county have passed resolutions asking that some steps be taken to force dog owners to get licenses in order that there can be some check on the depredations of the animals. It is expected by the county court that special deputies from the sheriff's office start out April 10 and all parts of the county will be visited and owners of non-licensed dogs will be cited to appear in court and explain.

The law on this subject as quoted by the county court provides that a fine of \$10 will be assessed against an owner of a non-licensed dog and if the fine is not paid within a period of 30 days that an additional fine of \$10 can be levied. All dog owners are required to have new licenses after January 1 and this law will now be strictly enforced, is the announcement.

### ENGAGEMENT OF MISS GISH TOLD

NEW YORK, March 31.—A story of an official engagement to marry Miss Gish, which later became official and then was broken, has been told in federal court by Charles H. Duell, who is seeking to compel the green star to make pictures only for his company.

While Duell was testifying yesterday about the engagement Miss Gish denied her face with her handkerchief and some spectators thought they saw tears in her eyes. Before the trial she said that the claim of Duell that they had been engaged was "unwarranted presumption." He testified that the "unofficial" engagement began in June 1923, shortly after he had been separated from his wife. After his divorce, he said, the engagement became "official" and it was broken on April 2, 1924, by mutual consent.

### Mr. Geary Resumes Witness Stand at Rail Rate Hearing

CHICAGO, March 31.—A. M. Geary of Portland, Ore., counsel for Oregon wool growers and cattle breeders associations and for a northwestern shippers' association, resumed the witness stand today at the interstate commerce commission hearing concerning the freight rates on livestock.

Complaining livestock breeders contend that they are losing money and some cases being forced out of business by market conditions and the redress of an alleged disparity between freight rates and market prices. Mr. Geary testified that the membership of the breeders' associations represented had decreased as a result of adverse conditions and that the cattle and sheep, on the northwestern ranges had decreased two to three hundred thousand head since 1920.

T. O. Russell, engineer in charge of construction work on the new Eugene-Klamath Falls cutoff of the Southern Pacific railway, will be the principal speaker at the noon luncheon meeting of the Eugene Lions club to be held at the Osburn hotel tomorrow, according to an announcement today. The engineer will speak on "Railroad Development in Oregon."

Long, general manager of the Weyerhaeuser company in a letter to R. A. Long, director of the Long-Bell Lumber company, now in Longview, who made the letter public.

The announcement followed a conference Sunday of Long-Bell and Weyerhaeuser officials. In his letter Mr. Long said it was the intention of his company to push forward "the work with as much celerity as practicable."

LOS ANGELES, March 31.—Two persons are under arrest in connection with the death early Monday of Mrs. Helen R. Osborne, 21, whom police believe to be the victim of poison liquor served at a party. Those under arrest are Clarence B. Osborne, husband of the dead woman, and Shirley Wing, in whose home the death occurred.

### British Fleet is To Salute Prince

ON BOARD H. M. S. REPULSE, March 31.—(Wireless to London)—The British Atlantic fleet which is en route homeward from the combined fleet exercises in the Mediterranean, altered its course today at the request of the Prince of Wales to salute the Republic, on which the prince is traveling on his voyage to South Africa and South America.

### Postal Officials Will be Demoted

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Postmaster General New today directed the restoration to duty with demotion of each of the six postal supervisor officials suspended January 2 for their connection with efforts to influence legislation at the time of consideration of the postal pay increase bill.

NEW YORK, March 31.—Four men Monday raided the offices of Sobel and Kalelo, diamond brokers of Maiden Lane and escaped with unset diamonds valued at between \$50,000 and \$100,000. The robbery was opposite the new Federal Reserve Bank building.

### 88 BUSES BURN IN SWEEPING FIRE IN YELLOWSTONE

LIVINGSTON, Mont., March 31.—Swept by the most disastrous fire in its history, the little town of Mammoth Hot Springs, in Yellowstone national park today took toll of the damage wrought yesterday when flames, fanned by a monsoon breeze, gutted its main place of industry and threatened to destroy a portion of the town.

The damage early today had been estimated at approximately \$600,000. The plant of the Yellowstone Park Transportation company and 88 buses stored in it were a charred mass of ruins. A machine shop, paint shop and a repair shop also were destroyed. An oil furnace explosion in a blacksmith shop started the fire.

### Hotel Destroyed

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., March 31.—The historic Manton Park hotel, a mecca for wealthy tourists, today was a smouldering mass of debris as the result of fire, which yesterday swept the hotel and surrounding timberland in the upper reaches of the park, eight miles north of Woodland Park, near here. Driven by a blustering wind the flames licked through a forest as dry as tinder and were controlled only after a heroic battle by forest rangers, Boy Scouts and volunteers.

### Chicken Dinner Planned Tonight

SPRINGFIELD, March 31.—(Special)—Forty persons from Springfield are expected to attend the chicken dinner and radio program tonight in the Thurston grand hall at which the members of the Springfield Lions club will entertain their wives. The dinner is to be served at 7 o'clock by a number of women in the Thurston neighborhood, followed by the radio program at 8:30 p. m. The program is to be broadcasted by the Portland Lions club from the Oregonian KGW broadcasting station. W. Henry Adrien has installed the radio in the Thurston hall.

### Lineman Seriously Injured by Shock

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., March 31.—Walter G. Folsom, lineman employed by the California Oregon Power company was perhaps fatally hurt early Monday afternoon when he came in contact with a high tension wire, while working in the residential district. Reports from the hospital indicated that he probably wouldn't live.
