

SALEM LOSES TO CONNECTICUT FIVE IN TOURNAMENT

CHICAGO, April 1.—(AP)—Fighting hard for mastery of a game that was decided entirely in the second half, Torrington, Conn., high school, today won the first game of the second day's play in the national basketball tournament from Salem, Ore., 27 to 23.

Torrington's left forward, Sposzowski, was the star, shooting eight baskets and taking three free throws. The first half dragged. Players on neither side warmed up until the second when the lead changed hands frequently and the decision was delayed until the last two minutes of play.
