

BOARD SEEKS ONLY TO BORROW CREDIT, DECLARES SPEAKER

That the city water board seeks only to borrow Eugene's credit to improve its water supply, and that the board expects to pay the interest and cost of retiring the bonds from the sale of water, was the statement by J. W. McArthur and C. A. McClain of the city water board last night at the meeting of the East Eugene Improvement club at the Fairmount Presbyterian church.

After outlining the method of supplying water through the lower McKenzie, Mr. McArthur said that investigation has shown that the lower McKenzie is the most practical source for pure water; that the present water supply might be satisfactory if no other source were available, and that the general contamination tests showed the Willamette had a much higher percentage of impurity.

Population of Eugene in 1930, upon which the water supply will be based, is estimated by the board between 50,000 and 75,000, the speaker declared. In 1918 the city consumed 29 million gallons a month; in 1924 it used 60 million gallons; and during the same period the number of families served was doubled. Taking into consideration the present rate of increase, the board figures 180 million gallons a month would be about right for 1930.

Whatever water system we use we must provide for this growth," said Mr. McArthur. "It is proposed to lay a 30-inch pipe six miles to Hayden bridge. This pipe would bring in under present conditions by gravity six million gallons a day or the 180 million gallons a month needed to supply the city in 1930. By some changes, eight million gallons a day can be delivered. By the use of pumps a Hayden bridge, the 30-inch pipe could carry 10 million gallons daily, which would supply 100,000 people."

Carl Washburne spoke on the fire apparatus issue and the proposed city hall repairs. T. H. Garrett discussed the McKenzie project, and Mayor E. B. Parks told of the street intersection paving issues and the garbage incinerator issue. If the intersection bonds are held up there will be no more paving, the mayor stated.
