### Canadian Hogs Prosper in 1924

WINNIPEG, April 2.—(AP)—More hogs were marketed by farmers at stockyards throughout Canada in 1924 than in any previous year, according to the federal department of agriculture. The report of the department put the 1924 total at 3,940,000 head, compared with 2,563,000 in 1923. The number of hogs owned on prairie farms jumped from 1,037,784 in 1923 to 2,349,457 in 1924.

### Miss Potter Elected

Miss Alberta Potter of Eugene has been appointed head of violin instruction at Alabama Women's college, one of the leading music schools of the south. It is announced, Miss Potter is a graduate in music from the University of Oregon, and studied in 1922-24 with Franz Kneisel in New York. During four years at the university she studied under Rex Underwood at the university.

### No Drive Planned

Organization of a Red Cross disaster relief unit has been set up in St. Louis for victims of the tornado which devastated a large area in Illinois and Indiana, but no general appeal through chapters is to be made in the seven western states and Alaska, according to word received by the Lane county chapter of the Red Cross today. Governors of Illinois and Indiana have officially requested that the Red Cross administer the funds which shall be collected, and have charge of all relief work. Voluntary contributions may be made, however, and will be forwarded promptly to the stricken territory. It is stated, but because of the distance it will not be available to take contributions of clothing, food, etc.

### To Improve Grounds

Preparing ground for the planting of flowers has kept the university ground workmen busy the last week spading between University and Onyx streets and south of the extension building on University street. Chrysanthemums and wild aster bulbs have been planted on the fourth acre strip back of the university depot tool house, and dahlias and aster seeds placed in the ground near the extension building. Work on grading of the parking along Kincaid street near Oregon building, and the ground around and in front of the Y. M. C. A. hut has recently been completed.

### R. O. T. C. Review Planned

Six companies, and the band of the R. O. T. C. of the university will take part in a series of parades and reviews starting about April 20, it is announced. The parades, which are to be six in all, will be held on Thursday evenings. Order to this effect has been issued by Colonel Simclair as a result of instructions from the war department, which provide for assemblies of all the companies for drill. No regular drill periods will be held during the first two weeks of June. Students and citizens of Eugene will be privileged to witness all the R. O. T. C. ceremonies.

### Bad Check Cashed

The Golden Pheasant restaurant of Corvallis has written W. G. Jenkins, chief of police, regarding a \$15 check recently cashed for E. A. Hogan of Eugene which proved to be worthless. The man has left the country, the letter stated, and the restaurant wondered if Mr. Jenkins knew where he had gone. The police have no record of Mr. Hogan.

### Here From Junction City

J. Hansen, resident of the Junction City district, was a business visitor in Eugene today. Mr. Hansen is among those who are opposed to the proposed organization of a union high school district, comprising nine present districts. The visitor states that a remonstrance against the plan is under way.

### Ruling is Made

Assistant professors were granted the right to vote in University of Oregon faculty meetings at the last meeting of the board of regents, it is announced. Voting power has heretofore been confined to full and associate professors. The new act increases the voting power of the faculty about 50 per cent.

### Union School Talked

Steps toward the organization of a union high school district, including nine districts, is under way at Junction City and this matter is expected to come up for a vote in the near future, according to Edward P. Bailey, attorney of Junction City, who was a business visitor here today.

### Name is Refused

The man wounded by deputy sheriffs during a raid on a still on the upper McKenzie river Tuesday is still at the Pacific Christian hospital and is recovering. He still declines to give his name or any information about himself, according to Sheriff Frank Taylor.

### J. O. Fleming Guilty

Acquitted by a justice court jury at Oakridge three weeks ago of operating a moonshine still, J. O. Fleming was found guilty in Eugene Justice court yesterday of having moonshine mash in his possession, and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$500 and serve six months in jail.

### Ranger Transferred

Walter Sackman, ranger at Waldport on the Siuslaw National forest, has been transferred to the Crater National forest, and his place will be filled by J. H. McClanahan, announced R. S. Shelley, Siuslaw supervisor. Mr. Sackman has been on the Siuslaw forest about a year.

### Motorists Fined

Two motorists, J. C. Morello and Edward Eisenstein, paid fines of \$2 each in municipal court this morning for parking their automobiles overtime on city streets. These were the first traffic fines for the month.

### Bounty Report Made

Lane county paid out \$264 on bounties on predatory animals during the month of March, according to the report of R. S. Bryson, county clerk, announced today. Half of the total is paid by the state and funds returned to the county.
