

SPECIAL TRAINS TO CARRY GUARDSMEN TO MEDFORD CAMP

SALEM, Ore., April 2.—Six special passenger trains will be required to carry national guard troops to Medford in June, according to train schedules for the movement issued today by Brigadier-General George A. White, commander of the reinforced brigade, which is to have its field training in southern Oregon beginning June 12.

Troops from eastern Oregon and the west coast will leave home during June 11, and will converge on Portland and points south where they will board the six special troop trains that are to lead the entire command at Medford during the morning of June 12. Twenty-five hundred men are affected by this movement, all belonging to the eighty-second infantry brigade, and attached units. The units of the command are the 162nd and 185th infantry regiments comprising the eighty-second brigade with attached units consisting of battery A, 148th field battery, company of 116th combat engineer and hospital, company 167.

Cities contributing troops to the southern Oregon movement are Baker, La Grande, The Dalles, Green-

ham, Portland, St. Helens, Astoria, Forest Grove, Tillamook, McMinnville, Salem, Corvallis, Dallas, Woodburn, Silverton, Lebanon, Eugene, Cottage Grove, Roseburg, Grants Pass and Medford. Announcement of the training point for other troops will be made in the near future. It was said, although the coast artillery will probably train at Fort Barry because of construction work at Fort Stevens, which will probably be undertaken too late to make that place available for this year's training.

Arrangements of the southern Oregon camp have been practically completed, and the actual construction work on the camp site will be commenced in a short time. Laying out of a field artillery firing range, requiring a five-mile field of fire will be undertaken next week in the vicinity of Medford.

Funds for all phases of the training movement and program have been set aside by the United States government.

FOX KILLING OPPOSED
DUBLIN, April 2.—(AP)—Hunting in the Free State, a pastime in which it is said \$5,000,000 annually is spent, and which attracts many sportsmen from England, is threatened by the continued destruction of foxes, which are caught in large numbers and sold for their skins.

There are 25 packs of foxhounds in the Free State and the government is urged to protect the sport by legislation, penalizing the destruction of the animals.

EVEREST CLIMBERS FIND BUTTERFLIES

LONDON, April 2.—(AP)—The cannibal spiders that live near the top of Mt. Everest exist at higher altitudes than any other animals known to man. They were described recently by the Royal Geographical society by Major R. W. G. Hingston, naturalist of the Mt. Everest expedition of 1924.

These spiders live in islands of broken rock surrounded by snow and ice, and for food they eat one another. Traces of this permanent animal existence were found far above the Himalayan snow line, and some 4000 feet above the last vegetable growth, Major Hingston explained.

A general idea of the natural life on the mountainous desert of the Tibetan plateau was given in the lecture. The atmosphere is so dry that the skin and nails of human beings split, and the ordinary decomposition of flesh is prevented altogether.

Wild sheep and mountain larks climb up the ranges, even to the barren slopes at 17,000 feet. "There is a little red-starch which builds its nest at the same inhospitable height, and we found grasshoppers at 18,000 feet, near the farthest limit of vegetable growth," Major Hingston declared.

"There were bees, moths and even butterflies at 21,000 feet," he said.

"and cloughs, a kind of crow, at the immense height of 27,000 feet."

To contend with the scarcity of food in these regions, some of the birds had specially modified bills for digging into frozen soil, so that they might reach hibernating insects. Burrowing and hibernating are the means by which many animals escape the extreme cold and manage to exist.

Some birds formed communities with mammals. Many little birds associated with horse-hares, and there was perfect confidence and harmony among them. At greater heights, on the almost barren mountains, was an association of cloughs and wild sheep. The clough sits on the sheep's back, and searches for insects in the animal's hair.

Student Bards put Out Poem Each day

SEATTLE, April 2.—(AP)—To produce poets is the purpose of a course in the dramatic art department of the University of Washington. Glenn Hughes, assistant professor in the department, teaches the class for bards which has already turned out a book of verse to show the world that poets are made as well as born.

In Mr. Hughes' class no attempt is made at first to teach rhyme. He avers that if the students begin on rhyme their verse will be "doggerel" of lacking in the elements of poetry.

Free verse is welcomed as allowing the students to concentrate on the images they are creating rather than on meter and rhyme. Each student submits a poem every week.

Playful Elephants Delay Travelers

THE HAGUE, Holland, April 2.—(AP)—Further reports received here concerning the mysterious deserted city in the Upper Langkat region of Sumatra state huge quantities of elephants' bones have been found there. This gives rise to the belief that there may be one of the hidden places to which elephants retire when they feel death approaching. African and Indian elephant hunters agree that sick elephants withdraw from their herds to some remote spot only known to themselves to die alone.

Elephants seem to be on the increase in Achene, the Sumatra Post observes in this connection. A light railway train which runs along the edge of the jungle was held up the other day by a herd of 40 big tuskers which leisurely amused themselves by pulling up all the fencing and bounding posts in sight before they decided to move on.

Close observers of gas consumption say that the hours of cooking vary in different towns. Brighton, for instance, spends more time on the sea-front and pier and goes on cooking until nearly 3 p. m. Nottingham inclines to the continental style and uses more gas for cooking in the evening. Scotland, with stricter observance of the Sabbath, does most of its cooking for Sunday on the previous day.
