JUSTICE HITZ ISSUES ORDER UPON PETITION

California-Orient Line of Shipping Board Held Up by Order
Petition Filed by Pacific Mail Company Line, One Of Bidders

WASHINGTON, April 3.—(AP)—A temporary injunction blocking sale of the shipping board's California-Orient line, was issued today by Justice Hitz of the District of Columbia supreme court.

Reasons Cited
In its petition the Pacific Mail company contended that the board's decision to sell the five vessels to the Dollar company, decided on after a bitter row among board members and by a majority of one, was illegal for many reasons.

Board Casts Vote
The board meantime went on record yesterday as holding that no legal barrier could be against the sale, declaring by a vote of 3 to 2 that there was nothing to refer to the attorney general for an opinion. Such an opinion was sought by Vice-Chairman Plummer, one of the opponents of the sale in a formal motion.

MR. O'CONNOR SPEAKS
WASHINGTON, April 3.—Chairman O'Connor of the shipping board said today he personally would favor termination of the operating contract with the Pacific Mail Steamship company for the five ships in the California-Orient line if the injunction sought by that company to prevent their sale to the Dollar interests should be made permanent.

EFFECT SAID SMALL
SAN FRANCISCO, April 3.—Granting of an injunction temporarily halting the ship sale in Washington will have no serious effect, according to Herbert Fleishacker, captain, on the plans of the Robert Dollar Steamship company, to operate the route's fleet.
