

PHI KAPPA PSIS HOLD THREE-DAY CONVENTION HERE

Fifty members of the Phi Kappa Psi, including delegates from four universities on the Pacific coast, are assembling in Eugene today for a three-day district convention at the home of the youngest chapter, Oregon Alpha, 729 Eleventh avenue east.

L. C. Williams, of Cleveland, Ohio, vice-president of the fraternity; U. H. Kinross, deputy archon of the district; Vernon Leimann of the University of Washington; and the Rev. Mr. William Wainwright Youngman of Portland are among the prominent Phi Psi attending the assembly.

A formal banquet at the Osburn hotel tonight, followed by a formal dance at the fraternity house, and an automobile trip up the McKenzie river highway Sunday are high-lights of the program planned for the visitors. The dedication ceremonies for the school of music will be attended Sunday afternoon.

Scholarship and expansion will be among the subjects discussed by the delegates today and tomorrow.

Kappa Psi was founded February 19, 1892, at Jefferson college, Washington, Penn., which is now Washington and Jefferson university. The fraternity has 48 chapters, the last installed being the Oregon Alpha, which was established in 1923.

Delegates from the Oregon chapter are Elmer Peterson, Kenneth Stephenson and Maurice Warnock. Alexander G. Brown and Francis W. Linklater are the chapter's alumni representatives.

The sixth district of the fraternity includes territory west of the Rocky mountains, and has four chapters. California Beta at Leland Stanford university, California Gamma at the University of California, Washington Alpha at the University of Washington, and Oregon Alpha at the University of Oregon. Three delegates are here from each of the active chapters. The alumni associations at Spokane, Portland, Seattle, Los Angeles and San Francisco are also represented by delegates.

STUDENTS TO HOLD FOREIGN PLAYLETS

A university event of special interest to take place on Saturday, afternoon and evening, is the "Festival of Nations" presented to be given at Guild hall theater by the Cosmopolitan club of the University of Oregon.

This club, which is composed almost entirely of foreign students of many different nationalities, was founded for the purpose of promoting international understanding and mutual good will.

Where possible, it is aimed to show actual customs of the peoples represented; for example, Mr. Chung, from Korea, sings a native Korean song without accompaniment, as in his homeland there are no musical instruments.

China will be represented by a beautiful scene of court life, including Chinese music and swordplay. The Philippine students will present a moonlight serenade with native music and dances. An Indian student, Duljit Singh Sudaria, will exhibit Hindu magic and illusions. Kate Lambert will dance an Irish jig. Rose and Helen McGrew will sing a German folksong. Alan Butts, English girl, will do a country dance. There will be a Scotch highland fling. Charlie Dawson with Mrs. Beck, will give a Swiss skit. Miss Cuevas and Carmen Espinosa will give a Spanish dance; the Gato Aracoma, Spanish recitation by Eusebio Espinosa, Mexican song by Ruth Kern.

Andree Pellion is arranging a selection from the opera "A la clare de lune" to be given by French students. There will be a short skit by Anne Yamamoto and Shigeo Fukuda depicting Japanese home-life and customs will give an exhibition of Judo wrestling. Russia will be represented by folk songs and the Greek number in which Christ Loukas, Dorothy Dixon and Miss Johnson take part, will symbolize the historical significance of that country to the world. The finale of the program will illustrate world brotherhood.

LUMBER BUSINESS BRISK FOR WEEK

One hundred and twenty-five mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending March 8, manufactured 163,656,844 feet of lumber; sold 121,790,884 feet; and shipped 111,750,885 feet.

New business was 17 1/2 per cent above production. Shipments were 8 per cent below new business.

Thirty-nine per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future delivery. This amounted to 47,034,815 feet, of which 9,355,379 feet was for domestic cargo delivery; and 18,288,436 feet export. New business by rail amounted to 257 cars.

Forty-four per cent of the lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 48,883,820 feet, of which 4,884,839 feet moved coastwise and intercoastal; and 18,998,981 feet export. Rail shipments totaled 148,191 cars. Local auto and team deliveries totaled 7,037,009 feet.

Unfilled domestic cargo orders totaled 142,346,272 feet. Unfilled export orders 100,611,876 feet. Unfilled rail orders 60,091 cars.

In the first thirteen weeks of the year, production reported to West Coast Lumbermen's association has been 1,264,349,106 feet; new business 239,032,754 feet; and shipments 1,155,408,912 feet.

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U. OF O. REPORTS 100 COURSES FOR SUMMER SESSION

"Nearly one hundred courses will be offered at the 1925 campus summer session, including many subjects of particular interest to members of the teaching profession," reads a statement in a recent issue of the University of Oregon News Bulletin, sent to teachers all over the state. The session opens June 22 and runs until July 31.

These courses will include the following fields: English, history, education, modern languages, economics, political science, chemistry, physics, mathematics, psychology, philosophy, journalism, physical education, library training, drama and the speech arts, and music.

The campus session will make use of all regular university equipment including the library, laboratories, and the gymnasium. Recreation will be found on the playing fields and the special trips that are given every year

to points of scenic interest. Besides the regular members of the university staff, there will be several visiting instructors of national reputation in the field of education. There will be the regular daily assemblies.

Some of the speakers at the assemblies will be Dr. A. A. Goldenweiser of New York, a lecturer, author, and noted student of anthropology and sociology. He will be a member of the Eugene faculty. Dr. Edward Hulme of Stanford university will give two history courses, and Burlingame of Stanford and Superintendent Price of Oklahoma will give assembly addresses.

Delegations Will Pass Through City

With a lengthy list of national conventions scheduled for the Pacific coast during the coming summer there will be a heavy traffic both by motor and rail line through Eugene and it is expected that there will be a large number make stop overs in this city for short visits. Medinah temple of Chicago of the Mystic Shrine, with a delegation of 1000, will return to their home from the Los Angeles convention by way of Portland, through Eugene, according to word received here. A large number of the special trains bearing the Elks delegations to the Portland national session will also pass through Eugene.
