

### JOHN C. VEATCH FILES ANSWER TO DR. ROSS' CHARGE

PORTLAND, Ore., April 3.—John C. Veatch, recently appointed state fish commissioner by Governor Pierce today filed answer to the quo warranto action brought about a week ago by Dr. Thomas W. Ross, deposed commissioner, asking that Veatch appear in court and show cause and by what authority he holds office as commissioner.

Ross, in his quo warranto action, claimed that he had never been legally dismissed from the commission, and that he was still a commissioner in fact.

Veatch in his answer denies that Ross' removal was illegal. He states that December 10, 1924, Governor Pierce brought charges against Ross on which the hearing was held December 22. Ross was subsequently removed from the commission and Veatch was appointed January 10, the answer states.

The dispute is expected to come up in court in about two weeks.

### Woman Lives in Trance 15 Years

RIETFONTAIN, South Africa, April 3.—(AP)—Scientists from England who have heard recently of the case of a woman here who has been in a trance for 15 years may come to Rietfontain to make extensive investigations with the hopes of helping the victim. The woman is Miss Anna Swanepoel, of Lichtenburg, age 35, who became unconscious in 1910 when she was notified of the sudden death of her fiance.

Not once, according to the attending physicians, since that time has the woman been fully conscious. After 14 years in her own home, under the care of relatives, she was taken to a hospital where attendants administer food and water every two hours.

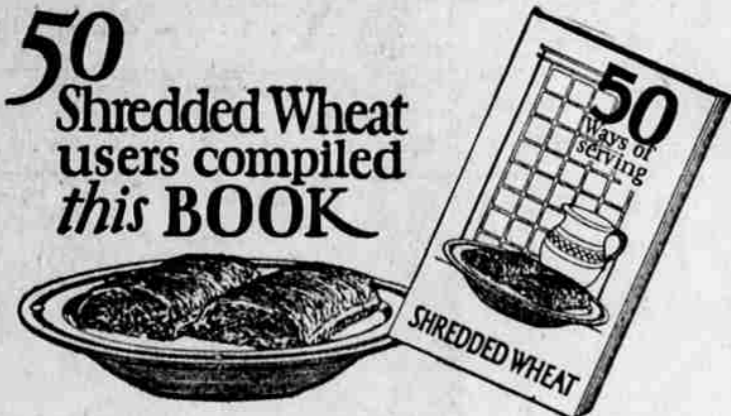
### Junction Grades Present Program
