FORMER TREASURY TELLER INDICTED

SALEM, Ore., April 4.—(Special.)—Clarence W. Thompson, former teller in the state treasury under State Treasurer O. P. Hoff and Jefferson Myers, was today indicted by the Marion county grand jury on a charge of larceny of public funds. The specific amount named in the indictment is \$931.36. Thompson is said to have returned to the state \$1031.36, covering the amount which he was accused of diverting at \$100 a week. He is alleged by detectives of a bonding company to have admitted to the diversion of an even \$5,000, but the complaint of the state mentioned only the smaller sum contained in the indictment.

During the recent session of the state legislature Thompson was calendar clerk in the house of representatives, and it was at that time that the charge against him was made known.

Mrs. Mary Magill Elected Delegate

SPRINGFIELD, April 4.—(Special.)—Mrs. Mary C. Magill was elected delegate from Springfield to the state convention of the Ladies of the Grand Army to be held in Oregon City, June 23, 24 and 25, at a meeting of the local group yesterday in Eggmann's hall. Mrs. Magill was elected to take the place of Mrs. Walter Laxton, who recently left with Mr. Laxton for Santa Fe, New Mexico, for an indefinite stay, due to the state of Mr. Laxton's health.

Early Crops Seen At Lane Orchards

Lane county fruit crops will mature about two weeks earlier this year than usual, according to the opinion today of C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector. "Although it is too early to make an accurate estimate of the time or extent of the fruit crops it looks as if there would be an early showing this spring and summer," Mr. Stewart said. The trees budged out early in the fall in many orchards and it is not believed that there was a large amount of damage as a result of the freeze in December. The buds on many fruit trees in various districts of the county are well developed, the inspector states.

PRISONERS ABIDE BY LAW, IS WORD

SALEM, Ore., April 4.—Warden Dalrymple of the state penitentiary today denied an accusation that is being placed before the state fish commission to the effect that the fishing laws of the state are being violated by the prisoners of the penitentiary. Frank N. Waters of Salem has written the commission, making the charge, and also complaining that the state does not maintain a fish ladder over the water wheel in the millrace at the prison.

According to Dalrymple a fish ladder would be impossible. The other matter in Waters' letter he denies. He says the trustees, under his administration, have never been allowed to fish outside the prison grounds, nor to go fishing dressed in citizens' clothes. He also denies that fish wardens have not been allowed to come on the prison premises.

Club Leader Takes Long Journey to 11 Lane Schools

Some indication of the extent of the area of the Lane county school system and the difficulty of visits to some of the districts is given in the report of Arnold Collier, assistant county superintendent of schools, who has returned after a trip of several days in western Lane, having visited 11 schools covering 153 miles in that district. To visit the school at Alpha, north of Deadwood, Mr. Collier left his car at the latter place, took a hike over the hills for three miles and borrowed a horse. He rode the horse for about two miles and then came to a place where blasting operations were in progress and the route was torn up. The first horse was left here and Mr. Collier walked farther, borrowed another horse and, finally reached his destination. The mud at places was so deep that the horse sunk as far as the saddle girth, Mr. Collier said. The school at Beck was visited and the trip down the river was made in the mail boat.

Springfield Bonds Sold to Portland Firm at Meeting

SPRINGFIELD, April 4.—(Special.)—The contract for the purchase of the \$12,500 bonds, passed by Springfield taxpayers on March 3 for a new school building, was awarded to Starkey, Hubbs, incorporated, Portland, at a special meeting of the school board of district 18 last night in the city hall. It was awarded on the bid of \$102.67. One other bid, \$104.40 from Ralph Schnellbach, Portland bond dealer, was submitted to the board. The Starkey, Hubbs, bid had all the legal formalities straightened out ahead of time and passed on by their attorneys.

The date for beginning the construction of the \$25,000 Brattain grade school cannot yet be announced, according to George Ditto, chairman of the school board. The site to be used for the school, the square block between Tenth and Eleventh and C and D streets, most of which was donated by the Brattain heirs, is part of an estate, and the boundaries for the title have not yet been determined. As soon as the papers with the boundary lines can be drawn up building operations will be begun.

Decrease Noted in Unemployment Here

Unemployment in Eugene, which was particularly noticeable during the winter months, has gradually decreased until it has reached a point where it is now little more than seasonal, according to Frank L. Armitage, superintendent of the federal labor office here. Growing demand for help on farms, and in mills and logging camps is noted.

Should the employment office be closed as a result of lack of financing, Mr. Armitage states, one or both of two things might result: workmen would be forced to go to a Portland office to obtain situations, or apply at a fee-charging agency to learn where jobs are available.

"Employees of the lumber companies spend more money in Eugene than any other group," says Mr. Armitage. "It is generally felt that it would be a wise take to close the doors of the employment office against them here. Now is the time when the city needs the office the least, and lumber offices need it the most."
