DOWNFALL OF REGIME TAKEN FOR GRANTED
M. de Monzie Looms as Winner in Battle Over Financial Policy
Speculation Rife on Possible Selection of New Cabinet Next Week

PARIS, April 6.—(AP)—The lobbies of the chamber of deputies and senate were crowded this afternoon with members of parliament and others active in the various political groups, most of whom, forecasting the fall of the Herriot ministry already were speculating in the composition of the next cabinet. Meanwhile the cabinet ministers were deliberating on the reported differences on policy between Premier Herriot and M. de Monzie, his new minister of finance.

Supreme Court Ruling Will Be Best, Says Attorney General
SALEM, Ore., April 6.—Declaring there is no proper occasion for the governor to ask the question, Attorney General Van Winkle, in a letter to Governor Pierce, declines to answer the governor's question whether the act appropriating \$125,000 for the construction at Independence of a model training school for the month-mouth normal school is constitutional.

DEFENSE CLOSES ITS TESTIMONY IN ELLINGSON CASE
SAN FRANCISCO, April 6.—(AP)—Shortly before noon today the defense closed its case to prove Dorothy Ellingson insane, and the prosecution began its effort to establish mental competence in the 17 year old girl, who killed her mother last January 13 in a quarrel over the girl's devotion to the night life.

CASCADE FOREST TO GET \$40,000 TO BUILD ROADS
The state of Oregon will receive almost one-seventh of the \$7,500,000 voted by congress for this purpose. The Cascade forest's share is allotted to specific projects approved by the district forest office, and which amount approximately to 20 per cent less than the amount available last year.

Agent Discovers Loss

STATE HOSPITAL INMATE IS SUICIDE
SALEM, Ore., April 6.—D. D. Wilder, a photographer whose home address was 350 east Stephens street, Portland, committed suicide at the state hospital for the insane last night, by strangling himself with a bed sheet which he had first attached to a water pipe. He was 52 years old.

POWER COMPANY REPORT IS FILED
SALEM, Ore., April 6.—The Mountain States Power company, which has offices at Albany, and serves a number of western Oregon cities with power and light, has submitted its annual report for 1924 to the public service commission. It shows operating revenues of \$1,075,080.22; an increase of \$96,912 over the previous year; operating expenses, \$728,452.55; an increase of \$91,007.41; taxes assessable to operations, \$96,463.85, a decrease of \$1915; and operating income, \$246,421.79, a decrease of \$82,412.75.

BUTTE, Mont., April 6.—The will of the late William Andrews Clark, Montana millionaire mining man and former United States senator, was admitted to probate, today on application of the executor, Charles W. Clark, W. A. Clark Jr., Mazy C. de Brabant, Katherine L. Morris and Annie E. Clark, who were named to serve without bonds.

Secretary Weeks Reported Better
WASHINGTON, April 6.—Secretary Weeks continued to gain rapidly today in his recovery from the slight stroke of cerebral thrombosis which has confined him to his home since last Wednesday. His condition was regarded as so favorable that his son Sinclair returned last night to Boston. Mr. Weeks is not expected to be permitted to leave his room for several days.

Edward E. Brodie Resigns his Post
WASHINGTON, April 6.—Resignation of Edward E. Brodie, American minister to Siam, will be accepted at his request. His successor has not been selected.

Plans for the making up of another carload shipment of Lane county hogs and sheep are being made by the Lane County Co-operative Shipping Association, according to a announcement today of H. A. Soules, a fount carload shipment will be sent tomorrow to the North Portland stockyards for sale. The large number of stock owners who desire to send out shipments necessitated the scheduling of another shipment for Tuesday, April 21, Mr. Soules states.

YOUTH PLEADS GUILTY
PORTLAND, Ore., April 6.—Paul Wong, a Chinese youth, formerly a teller for the Northwestern National bank, pleaded guilty in federal court here today to a charge of embezzlement and was sentenced to two years at McNeil's Island prison.

Pendleton to be Scene of Picture
PENDLETON, Ore., April 6.—An announcement was made here today by Henry W. Collins, president of the Pendleton round-up to the effect that the "Pony Express," a gigantic feature film as planned by Universal pictures, will be filmed in and around Pendleton this summer. Norman Kerry will star in the production, according to the announcement and about 1,000 persons will be in the cast. Later, it is planned, in another play, the round-up will be used as the background for a second western feature. Last year "The Saddle Hawk" and "Let 'er Buck" were filmed here by Universal.

SAPES ROBBED
PORTLAND, Ore., April 6.—Two safes were robbed here Sunday and \$1315 taken, the police reported today. One of the safes was in the public market, the other in the office of a motor car company.

Stores Are Moved—
Yesterday was moving day on Willamette street. Three stores were turned topsy-turvy when their fixtures and stocks were changed to a new location. To make room for a barber shop in the Matlock building and a mezzanine floor for a billiard room, Obak's Cigar store has been torn to pieces, and is rapidly assuming shape. Business was carried on as usual at the corner yesterday, the cash register being perched on a barrel while the fixtures and soda fountain were moved. At the same time J. J. McCormick's Cigar store at 730 Willamette was dismantled, the stock being placed in storage, and the room being occupied by Carroll Brothers' pharmacy, which moved its stock and fixtures from 783 Willamette street. The cigar store will move into the room now occupied by Large's Cigar and Salt house at 815 Willamette, and Pete Burr's barber shop will take the quarters vacated by the drug store. Bobb's Hardware store is being enlarged to fill the space recently vacated by the Romance Photograph studio at 777 Willamette street.
