Curtis Veatch and family motored up from Halsey Saturday night and spent the week-end with the W. H. Hawley and the J. Q. Willis families.

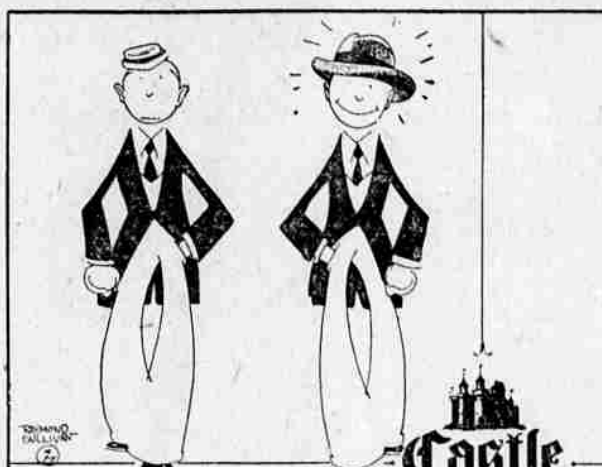
DEERHORN
