are the work of the class in tile making which has been working on them during the winter term. They are made of cement and colored a vivid blue, buff and yellow. They are being cemented into the hollow panels of the pillars of the patio and being of Moorish design give the court a decided oriental aspect.

**Golf Tourney Planned**—Plans for the second University of Oregon men's golf tournament have been announced by George Brounagle, captain of the varsity team. Matches will be played on the Eugene course this week as a basis for selecting the team, and all University men are eligible. The men chosen will go to Portland to represent the university in the Pacific coast intercollegiate golf tournament, to be held May 21 and 22. The campus champion for 1925 also will be determined in the matches this week.

**Col. Gilbert To Speak**—An address by Col. William S. Gilbert, veteran chaplain of two wars, minister, and member of the board of regents of the university, will be the feature of Thursday morning's assembly meeting on the campus, it is announced. Colonel Gilbert has lived at Astoria since the Spanish-American war. Previous to this he was pastor of the Central Presbyterian church of Eugene. He is at present executive secretary for the Presbyterian mission work with headquarters in Portland. His subject will be the "Romance of Astoria."

**To Give Lectures**—Professor Frederic S. Dunn, head of the Latin department, will give a stereopticon lecture on the scenes of Passion Week, to his Sunday school class of University students, at the Methodist church Sunday. Professor Albert R. Sweetser, of the botany department, will give a stereopticon lecture to his class on the same day. Pictures shown by Professor Dunn in the course of his lecture will be the Betrayal, the Last Supper, the Trail before Pilate, the Entombment, Easter Morning, the Empty Tomb, and the Crucifixion.

**Latin Is Taught**—Latin will be included in the University summer school curriculum this year for the first time since 1917. It was only a sporadic instance in 1917, as Latin courses had not been offered in summer school for some years previous to that time. Three courses are to be offered at the University by Professor Frederic S. Dunn, head of the Latin department; and one course will be given in Portland by J. E. A. Johnston, also of the Latin department.

**Smoking Moot Question**—Whether the time-honored tradition of not smoking on the University of Oregon campus should be relegated to the scrap heap will be the subject of a discussion at a meeting of the traditions committee of the university, appointed by Randall Jones, student body president, and which will meet tomorrow afternoon. Recommendations on traditions will be presented to the student council Wednesday evening.

**Co-eds Practice Archery**—Thirty women have signed up for archery this term. Practice has been

held in preparation for inter-class competition on next field day, which will be set soon. Class teams consisting of two members each may match marksmanship in both target and distance shooting on that day. Whether or not distance shooting will be scheduled for class competition will depend upon the ability and progress of the classes.

**Barrel of Eels Used**—Demands for eels for experimental purposes in the zoology department of the University led Leonard Mayfield, freshman, to go to Oregon City farm, where he obtained a whole barrel of more than 100 of the eels. The anatomy class is delighted with its new acquisition, and has proceeded to inject them with preserving preparation which has all the smell and indications of formaldehyde.

**Short Pants Banned**—The department of physical education for men has issued a notice requesting that the men playing tennis do not wear short gymnasium trousers while playing. The department has purchased long white pants for tennis wear, and they will be issued to all having uniform privileges. The new equipment should arrive in the near future.

**Junior Moose Elected**—Earl Neet was named dictator of the Junior Order of Moose at its meeting last night. Other officers chosen were: Vice-director, Myron Stevens; past dictator, Don Myers; prelate, Clifford Summers; secretary, Delbert Ward; treasurer, Launes Beard; trustee, Charles Bowers and Alford Schaner; governors, C. C. Crowl and J. M. Beaman.

**Favor Visiting Teacher**—Approval of the visiting teacher plan in Eugene was voted by the Parent-Teacher council at its meeting in Eugene yesterday, after Miss Theodora Elwell, who came to the city last year, talked before the meeting. Miss Elwell gave a brief report of her work, telling of the 54 cases she has handled in the various schools since coming here.

**Sells Apartment**—Mrs. M. E. Carter, who has returned to Eugene after a month's vacation and rest at the home of W. O. Cook, has sold her apartment house at 212 Fourteenth avenue east to Mrs. Vestal M. Carter. Mrs. M. E. Carter will occupy the home at 1651 Ferry street which she recently bought from Mrs. Iva M. Hall.

**\$70,777 OREGON'S ROAD FUND SHARE**  
Oregon ranks second in the list of states on the 10 per cent fund appropriation for the fiscal year of 1925, with a total of \$70,777, according to information just received by Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor of the Cascade national forest.

To be used by the forest service in building roads and trails within the national forests, for the benefit of the public, 10 per cent of all national forest receipts in each state is made available for use in that state. This is in addition to the 25 per cent of such receipts returned to the states and counties for road and school fund work. Lane county's share of the latter appropriation this year was \$15,502, and \$12,275 has already been turned over to the county treasurer by the government.

Oregon's \$70,777 is 10 per cent of the year's receipts from timber sales, grazing and special uses of the national forests. These 10 per cent fund appropriations have shown a general increase since the fund was established in 1911.

When the Western Lumber company timber sale in Lane county is in full swing, the government estimates that from \$20,000 to \$25,000 will accrue to Lane county each year, as its 25 per cent share, in addition to its share of the 10 per cent for road and trail work.

## Bonus Ruling Made By Veterans' Bureau

The adjusted compensation division of the veterans' bureau requires that in all claims for adjusted compensation filed by dependents of deceased veterans, a death certificate for the veteran must accompany the application if his death occurred after leaving the service, it is announced at the Eugene office of the American Red Cross.

If the application is filed by a guardian of a minor child or mentally incapacitated person, there should also be attached a copy of the court order appointing the guardian and an affidavit by the guardian himself.
