

RECORD FOR RURAL MAIL ESTABLISHED

"Just look over those trucks," was the comment this morning of Darwin E. Yoran, Eugene postmaster, as he indicated three rural mail vehicles loaded and ready for delivery with the largest single day's delivery of rural mail, as far as bulk is concerned, that has been sent out of this office," the postmaster reported.

The packages were piled high on the front fenders, in the seats around the drivers, and at about every point on the cars where they could be fastened. "The carriers cannot carry the whole on one trip and it will necessitate a return to the office for a second load," Mr. Yoran said.

One cause that added to the heavy bulk of the mail today was the sending of 1475 sample packages of a popular brand of breakfast cereal.

These packages, one to every resident on the rural routes, made up a huge pyramid of cartons that was piled high in the back room of the postoffice.

"No Christmas rush ever equaled the rural mail going out today," the postmaster declared.

Two Huge Stills Are Brought Out By Raiding Party

Two huge stills, each of about 100 gallons capacity, were brought in by Chief Deputy Van Staverud from their location on the upper McKenzie across from Deerhorn yesterday afternoon. The stills were set on bases ready for operation and were about six feet apart. No one was near the plant and after watching since Sunday night the party of raiders including two federal operatives destroyed one of the stills and brought the other here to add to the collection at the sheriff's office. A large quantity of mash, approximately 3000 gallons, was destroyed. This is the largest amount of mash yet found at a Lane liquor plant. These two stills, and one taken March 31 and the big boiler of 150 gallons capacity taken about two years ago and supposed to be owned by Mark Brown, all of them from the upper McKenzie all indicate by the workmanship that they were made by the same parties, according to the opinion of county officials.

Report on Deaths For Month Higher

Deaths exceeded births in Lane county during the past month, according to the monthly report prepared by Dr. S. M. Kerron to submit to the state board of health. A total of 39 deaths were recorded and 31 births. This is rather unusual as during the past the births were more each month than deaths. "March is usually a month of higher mortality due to more sickness during this period especially pneumonia," the health officer states.

Library Loans for March Total 4976

A total of 4976 books were circulated by the Eugene public library during the month of March, according to an announcement by Miss Adelaide Lilley, librarian. Of this number, 3915 were loaned to adults and 1061 to children.

Fiction books were taken out by 3122 adults, and non-fiction by 783. The library was open 20 days; the average daily circulation being 191. The largest single day's circulation was 351 and the smallest, 127. The Sunday afternoon reading room was used by 272, and books repaired totaled 233.
