tion among the customers in the years to come.

"The people should also vote the \$125,000 measure for the new reservoir on Skinner's butte, the second level reservoir on Fairmount boulevard and mains leading to it," says Mr. McLain. "Eugene's reservoir capacity is way below the underwriters' requirement for a city our size. The capacity is a quarter of a million gallons, and we plan to put a three-million gallon reservoir in its place. Even then we will be from 25 to 30 cent below the requirement for the city, even with a total capacity of seven million gallons, including the fire reservoir with a million gallons capacity."

Customers Doubled

"Eugene has doubled its number of customers and water furnished since 1914 when the last mains and the college hill reservoir were put in. We must have more mains to reach the demands made for service, and we should have better pressure as a means of fire protection and to provide service when the demand is at its maximum."

"This measure would provide pressure for the people in the Fairmount Victoria heights, Kincaid park and Chula Vista districts, by use of the new second level reservoir. These people must now either repump the water or have their own water systems."
