

UNIVERSITY GIVEN MURAL LANDSCAPE

A decorative mural landscape, the work of Hazel D. Borders, a senior in the school of architecture and allied arts, was hung in the lounge of the new school of music auditorium as a feature of the dedication of the music building. The mural was admired by hundreds of visitors who came to inspect the music auditorium and listen to the dedicatory program.

The lounge adjoins both the music auditorium and the school of music building, serving as a connecting link between the two. It is a tastefully furnished room and is used for small receptions, the entertaining of visiting artists, and an assembly and meeting place for student groups. Miss Borders' mural has been placed above the fireplace, and because it was executed particularly for the room, serves "as a jewel in a setting."

Miss Borders chose the color scheme and the type of landscape that seemed to fit the problem. She took into consideration the nature of the room, its coloring, and the use to which it is put. The little group of dancing figures in the picture and a musician playing relate the mural to the school of music. Miss Borders worked under the direction of N. B. Zane, assistant professor in the school of architecture and allied arts.

The frame for the picture was designed in the normal arts studio at the university and was made by a Eugene planning mill. Every part of the picture, therefore, was the product of local artists and craftsmen.

ORATORY TRYOUTS TO BE SATURDAY

Candidates for the place as University of Oregon representative in the national intercollegiate oratorical contest, the subject of which deals with the American Constitution, will take part in a tryout here Saturday morning, before Prof. H. E. Hossou, debate coach, and E. W. Merrill, assistant coach.

The contest, financed and conducted by the Better American Federation of California, is for the purpose of increasing interest in and respect for the Constitution. In the final grand contest, to be held in Los Angeles, June 5, \$5,000 in prizes will be given to the seven district orators who come first in this contest, as follows: \$2,000 first; \$1,000 second; \$500, third; \$450 fourth; \$400 fifth; \$350 sixth, and \$300 seventh.

The Oregon contestant's manuscript will be sent with those of other contestants from the Pacific district to the contest director, Washington, D. C. A committee will select the seven best manuscripts from the Pacific area, and the authors will meet in a district preliminary contest at San Francisco, May 22. The winner will enter the final with the winners of the northeastern, northern, eastern, southern, midwestern, and central districts.

The orations must be on one of the following subjects: Washington and the Constitution; Hamilton and the Constitution; Jefferson and the Constitution; Marshall and the Constitution; Madison and the Constitution; Webster and the Constitution; and Lincoln and the Constitution.
