In addition to land exchange examinations will be started shortly. Before the O. A. C. students enter the Fall creek section, work on improving the Fall creek road will be carried on in cooperation with the county.

Measuring and marking out trails in the Oakridge district for the erection of sign boards is on the calendar, and this work will be finished before the beginning of the vacation season.

A new scaler's office is being built at Westfir, where the forest has three men employed on the Western Lumber company sale area. Approximately 200 acres are marked by the foresters in advance of the lumber company's cutting operations.

A number of miles, kept in Eugene for the past winter, are to be taken to Oakridge next week for use in construction work. Twenty-six thousand pounds of powder, and 15,000 caps, also for use on construction work, has been ordered by the local office, for immediate delivery.

Nelson F. Mauduff, supervisor of the forest, expects to make field trips both to Reserve and Oakridge next week, to confer with district rangers, and work out plans for the activities in each district the coming summer.

Arthur Moses, chief clerk, will begin issuing of grazing permits before the first of May to livestock owners who use the government territory for grazing during the summer.

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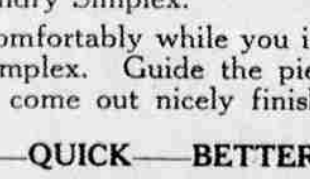
