COURT REFUSES SHEPHERD WRIT FOR FREEDOM

Fourth Attempt to Gain Liberty Is Futile; Court Change Is Asked

Mercury Is Found in Body of Mrs. Emma McClintock Is Word

JURISDICTION DISPUTED CHICAGO, April 10.—Federal courts may be asked by the defense to take jurisdiction of the case of William D. Shepherd, charged with the murder of his foster son, William N. McClintock, it was learned today after the Illinois supreme court at Springfield had refused a writ of habeas corpus. It was the fourth futile attempt in the defense untried efforts to get Shepherd out of jail.

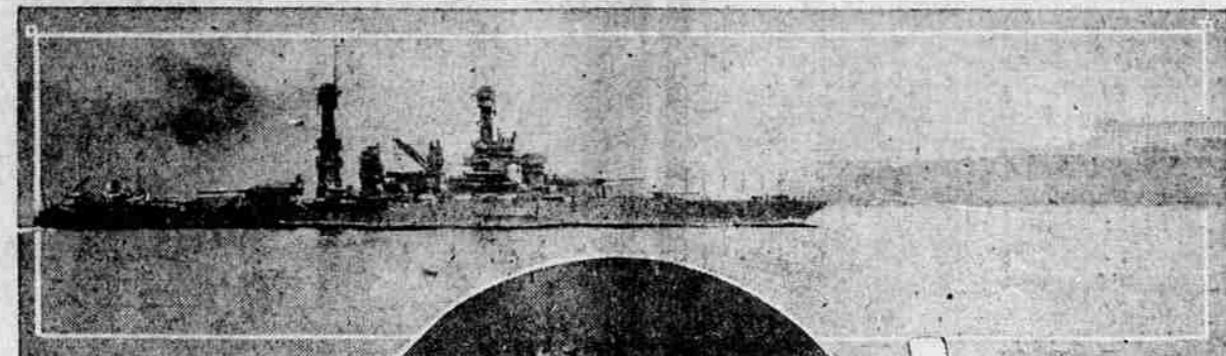
