

COUNCIL TO PASS ON LABOR OFFICE AT NEXT MEETING

Shall the city council reconsider making an appropriation to help maintain the United States employment office?

This question will again be decided by the city council at another busy session Monday night, when Frank L. Chambers, president of the Eugene chamber of commerce, will appear in behalf of a number of prominent local citizens, to ask that the appropriation be continued on behalf of chamber employes who represent the biggest payroll in the county.

Other questions looming on the council calendar are on the recommendations for a city planning commission, favored at a mass meeting of citizens last night at the Y. M. C. A.; passage of several ordinances for street improvements; petitions, reports of committees and payment of March bills.

Harry Devereaux, city engineer, will recommend that the city council override the remonstrance of Lawrence T. Harris and Richard Shore Smith against the assessment on Heights boulevard. The amount assessed against property on this project was fair and just, Mr. Devereaux says, and benefited the property far more than the amount charged for it.

Other petitions ask for a street light at Twenty-sixth avenue and Columbia street; repair work of Twenty-fourth avenue by graveling, as well as Rainey street connecting Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth; sewer extensions in the block bounded by Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Oak and Willamette streets; and street improvement and sidewalk on Ferry street from Third avenue east for half a block.

SHERIFF TAYLOR IS ON JOURNEY SOUTH

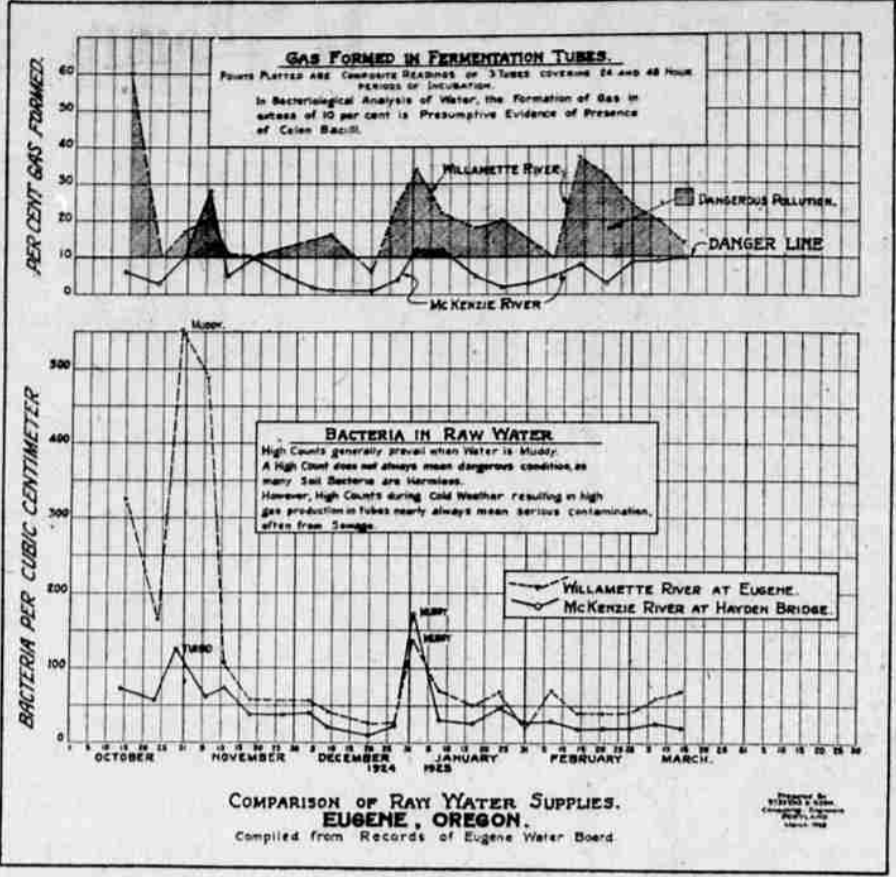

WATER TEST CHARTS PREPARED

Chemical Analysis of Water From McKenzie and Willamette Rivers Provides Proof of Need of New Supply, Sought in Bond Issue Proposal



Charts prepared from data obtained from chemical analysis of the waters of the Willamette and the McKenzie rivers are being displayed by C. A. McClain, superintendent of public utilities, to bring to the attention of Eugene voters the need for providing a source of pure water through the McKenzie water project bond issue to be up for a decision at the special election April 15.

The chart showing the comparisons between the Willamette and McKenzie rivers contains daily analysis reports on bacteria and gas fermentation. The gas fermentation is indicative of colon bacilli, the source of disease. The bacteria analysis showing the content indicates the relative difference found between the samples of Willamette and McKenzie river waters.

The figures on the charts contain exact daily reports from October 15 to March 15. In explanation of the lines on the graph Mr. McClain states that on the chart showing gas fermentation that in the three months period under survey the McKenzie only twice crossed the "danger line" as vividly shown on the chart, once in October during the heavy flood and again during the thaw early in January. Only twice in the period of three months has the McKenzie showed a higher bacteria content than the Willamette, the figures indicate.
