

PROJECT MANAGER FOR RECLAMATION SERVICE OPPOSED

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 10.—Herbert D. Newell, project manager for the reclamation service, Klamath irrigation district, will not be deposited by Secretary of the Interior Work.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 10.—In charge of Herbert D. Newell, project manager for the reclamation service on the Klamath irrigation district, and immediate investigation of the reputed secret contract by which the power rights on the project were sold by a former board and the reclamation service to the California Oregon Power company, were urged by directors of the district at a conference here yesterday with Dr. Hubert Work, secretary of the interior, and Elwood Mead, reclamation commissioner.

K. E. Bradbury, chairman of the irrigation board, charged that the presence here of Manager Newell is detrimental to the interests of the water users and should be relieved from office.

Bradbury and other members of the board also contended that valuable water and power rights were turned over to the power company for \$120,000 when they rightfully belonged to the district.

It was pointed out that under an act of the Oregon legislature in 1905, the water of Klamath lake and the Klamath river were deeded by the state of Oregon to the reclamation service for reclamation purposes in this district, but that contrary to this act of the legislature, a former board sold the power rights to the California-Oregon Power company in perpetuity for \$120,000.

Members of the board charged that this contract was entered into secretly in 1923, and it was nearly a year before the water users learned of the contract. At a special election last year, it was declared, the water users instructed the old board to start proceedings for the revocation of this sale, but the board refused to take any action.

Secretary Work told the irrigation directors that his department is not interested in water power, but that he is trying to aid the farmers, and he promised a full and complete investigation into their complaints.

Members of the irrigation board admitted that the water used for power purposes thus far had not depleted the supply for irrigation purposes, but it was their contention that the farmers themselves should profit by the water projects and thus assist them in paying for the cost of the irrigation project.

LUMBER BUSINESS ABOVE PRODUCTION

One hundred and twenty-nine mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending April 4, manufactured 101,227,785 feet of lumber; sold 117,243,791 feet; and shipped 124,387,010 feet.

Local business was 10 per cent above production. Shipments were 6 per cent above new business.

Thirty-nine per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 45,900,631 feet, of which 95,788,853 feet was for domestic cargo delivery; and 9,711,778 feet export. New business by rail amounted to 2143 cars.

Forty-three per cent of the lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 53,818,850 feet, of which 55,998,039 feet moved coastwise and intercoastal; and 18,145,811 feet export. Rail shipments totaled 2104 cars.

Local auto and team deliveries totaled 7,433,169 feet.

Unfilled domestic cargo orders totaled 122,122,454 feet. Unfilled export orders 88,962,361 feet. Unfilled all trade orders 5764 cars.

In the first 14 weeks of the year, production reported to West Coast Lumbermen's association has been 1,955,626,891 feet; new business 1,566,277,545 feet; and shipments 1,580,795,922 feet.

Check Artist at Salem Admits he Worked in Eugene

SALEM, Ore., April 10.—Salem police officers Thursday arrested Ray Hill, who is accused of having stolen a few days ago the payroll of the Coos Bay Stevedoring company of North Bend, amounting to \$746.50. Of the 42 checks that were issued by the stevedoring company, 28 were found on Hill's possession, according to officers, who believe he succeeded in cashing the other three. Hill claimed to have found the checks.

Hill was arrested when he attempted to pass on a local merchant check for \$53.50. All of the checks are countersigned by the president and cashier of the stevedoring company and they range in denomination from \$5 to \$37. Hill is said to have confessed to cashing two checks in Eugene. In his possession, when arrested, was a new pocket knife, new stem clock and new pair of shoes, indicating that he had cashed some of the checks.

Air Progress Told By Noted Aviator

Aviation, past and present; the evolution from the flimsy 25-horsepower plane of 1908 to the mammoth 400-horsepower Liberty motor driven craft in which Lieutenant Oakley G. Kelly made his phenomenal non-stop transcontinental flight, was the story graphically recounted by Lieutenant Kelly himself in his lecture, "The Progress of Aviation," at Villard hall last night.

Lieutenant Kelly, who is in Eugene under the auspices of the Lane County Reserve Officers association, is at present one of the army's premier fliers.

Following the lecture, Lieutenant Kelly showed three reels of motion pictures, illustrating the developments in aviation since 1908; the experimental base at McCook fields, and pictures of the famous T-2 plane, in which Lieutenant Kelly finally made his trans-continental flight in 1923, after three unsuccessful attempts. The T-2, which is now in the Smithsonian Institute, at Washington, at one time held nine world aviation records.

Preceding Lieutenant Kelly's lecture a reel of motion pictures taken at the Citizen's military training camp, at Camp Lewis, Washington, last summer, were shown, depicting the various phases of army life at the camp.

Delzell, who is now in California, suggesting that he request the California governor to sign the bill.
