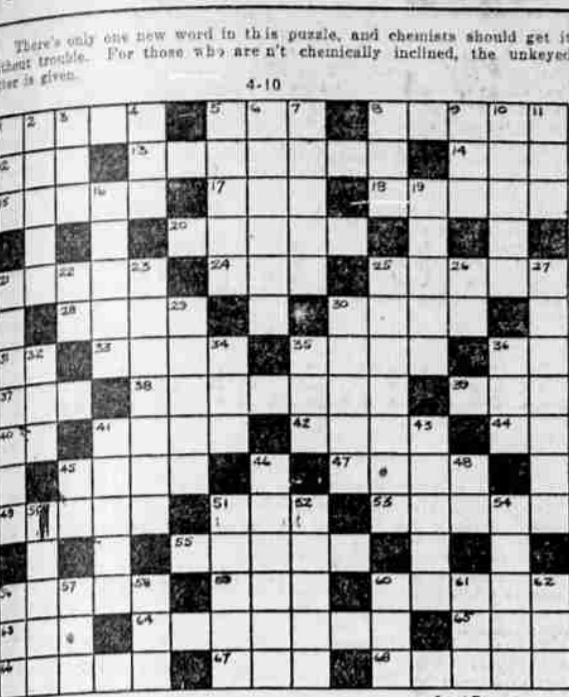

Quarantine Will Not be Changed

SALEM, Ore., April 10—No change in the quarantine against importation of California cattle, sheep and swine into Oregon will be made at present, the state livestock sanitary board decided at a special meeting here. And action exposing Oregon livestock to the hoof and mouth disease will be opposed, Governor Pierce indicated. He intimated that in addition to protecting Oregon livestock the quarantine might have the effect of improving the cattle market in Portland.

Home Hints

- IF BUTTONHOLES are to be subjected to considerable strain, strengthen them by outlining with a row of machine stitching before they are cut out and worked.
Use Finest Sugar
If you use coarse granulated sugar in cake making you must be prepared to have a coarse texture and hard crust.
Waterproof Floors
Cement floors are porous and should be waterproofed with one of the special paints made for that purpose.
Sandpaper the Needs
When the needle of the sewing machine becomes dull, stich for several minutes through a fine sandpaper.
Wash Woodwork
White furniture or woodwork that is not badly soiled should be washed with borax water instead of soap.
Save Bacon Rinds
Bacon rinds should be saved for flavoring soups and spreading over the top of beans while baking.
Small Panel Decoration
If the walls are divided into panels, and there are two narrow panels on either side of a large one, as over a fireplace or at a doorway, the small panels may be decorated as shown here. A small picture in each is enough, and if there are two scenes as those shown here, they are made even more decorative.
